Let Children Take Part In Decisions of Family Is Advice of Teacher

Madison, Wis. —(U.P.)— Consider each child as an individual and give him a chance to take part in family decisions, says Viola Hunt, family life specialist at the University of Wisconsin.

She says some families are too strict with their children, while others exercise too little control. One system is just as bad as the other, Miss Hunt says.

Work usually gets done quickly when the parents say sharply, "do this," but the child is likely either to become rebellious or quiet and withdrawn.

She says youngsters want to become independent as fast as they can, but they still depend on their parents to apply some discipline.

Miss Hunt urges parents to give children some choice in spending money, choosing clothes, making friends and deciding on rules.

She says democratic family living doesn't always work, but studies show that teenagers from these families have fewer school and community problems.

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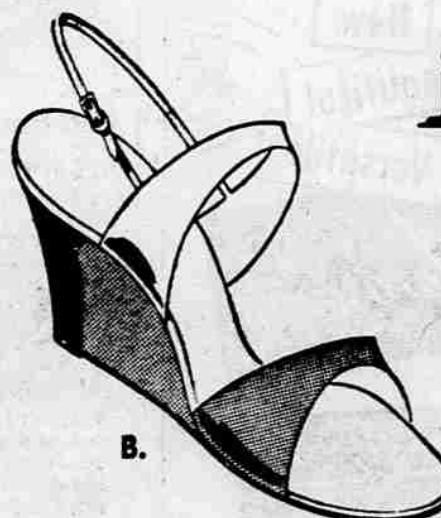
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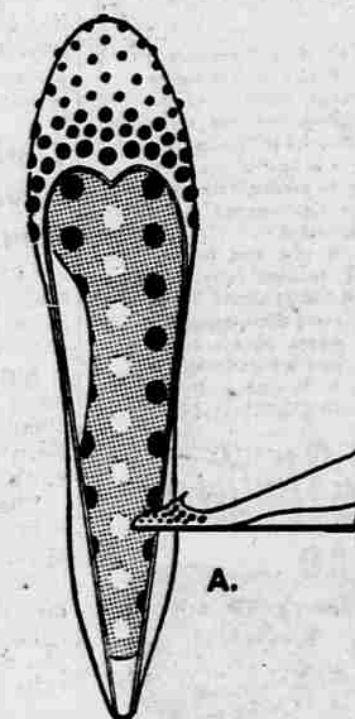
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
