Give Bored Husband Taste Of Managing House Alone

A person often changes his tune when he gets a taste of what it means to have the responsibility of a home on his shoulders. A woman writes:

(Q) "My husband is always telling me to leave, after 20 years of marriage and three children, 16, 17, and 18 years of age. He says he would manage beautifully without me in the house and that's the only way he will be happy. This just started about a year ago. Before that, we got along wonderfully. Now he goes out by himself and when he's at home, he just sleeps or sits around, seldom saying a word. I just don't know what to do or where to turn. What would you advise me to do?"

(A) Go away for a visit to friends or relatives for several weeks and let your husband run

the home. He may discover that he could not get along as well as he thinks he can. While your children could doubtless run the home in your absence, urge them not to do any more than they now do. If they are in school or have jobs, it is not fair to expect them to sacrifice their own work or interests to run the home for their father.

Be sure, however, to let your husband know that this is just a visit and that you have no thought of deserting him. That is why you should not stay away from home for too long.

When you return, if things are no better, ask him if he wants a legal separation. Tell him you will go to the courts and apply for it, but that he will have to pay for the upkeep of your home and that you will take the children with you.

A man simply cannot tell his wife to get out of his home and his life as your husband is trying to do. He may have fallen in love with another woman and wants his freedom so he can marry her. If you give him his freedom, do so at your own price.

PREVENTION OF SEASICKNESS

You may not believe it, but every night, in the interval between the Lord's Prayer in Latin and the 23rd Psalm in English I confer with God and Hippocrates about today's column—if there is enough of it to be printed to speak of—and ask for guidance for tomorrow's.

Hippocrates observed about 400 B.C. that "sailing on the seas shows that motion disorders the body"—the first recorded description of sea-sickness.

If you have ever been seasick you may believe the legend that Cicero fleeing by sea from the decapitation decreed by Mark Anthony went back and submitted to beheading rather than suffer further. I suppose you may as well make it a good one while you're at it. Now it will be obvious that I have never been seasick.

Well, no, maybe it wasn't sea-sickness, but when you are quite finished describing your motion sickness, whether it is brought on by ship, plane, train, bus or automobile travel, just stand back and let me tell you about my vertigo.

Vertigo, according to the medical dictionary, is a sensation as if the external world were revolving around you.

One fine morning I got up, did my six rolls and half doz. movements of the Last Brady Symphony as usual—the symphony is the group of setting-up exercises described and illustrated in Little Lesson No. 6, for which send 25c and s.a.e.—and started to dress. Suddenly everything was revolving around me and I sprawled on the floor, all fours extended to prevent falling off the madly whirling world.

The only vertigo I had ever experienced lasted perhaps half a minute. Presently it was over, I resumed dressing, and I have experienced no disturbance since, although I have done some 25,000 forward rolls—somersaults, as I call 'em.

For years I have recommended the use of effervescent magnesium citrate solution (pleasant saline laxative) and small doses of atropine sulfate before sailing and in the first day or two of the voyage, as the best preventive against seasickness.

In the course of the last war a new seasickness remedy was introduced—dimenhydrinate tablets, 100 mg. It bears the trade mark "Dramamine." It gives fairly good results in many cases, but had some unpleasant effects in others. It can be obtained only on prescription.

U.S. 'Considering' Visit by Russians

Washington—(U.P.)—The United States still is giving "sympathetic consideration" to a proposed visit to Iowa of Russian farmers, it has been learned here.

If the visit is approved, the American strategy could explode a Soviet charge that the United States has thrown up an "iron curtain" around its borders.

Approval of the visit also would dampen the Russian charges against the United States which followed the recent cancellation of a trip to America by Soviet student editors.

Informants said a note will be dispatched to the Soviet govern-

ment soon, perhaps next week, announcing the U.S. decision. Officials were not saying what the decision will be.
