

Experimental Grass Plantings on View, Public is Invited

Experimental plantings of nine varieties of lawn grasses, made in the fall of 1953, are open for public inspection at the Southern Oregon Experimental farm just west of Talent, it was reported today.

They are grown side by side so that the merits of each can be easily observed. The experiment is of particular value to those planning to plant a new lawn, it was pointed out. The varieties being grown include Kentucky bluegrass, merion bluegrass, creeping red fescue, illahee red fescue, chewing fescue, highland bent, astoria bent, alta fescue and hard fescue.

Two other plots contain various mixtures of the lawn grasses.

Planting Rate Told

Grasses in the demonstration were planted in October, 1953, at the following rates per 250 square feet of area: Bentgrass, 2 1/2 pounds, alta fescue, 2 pounds, other fescues and bluegrasses 1 1/2 pounds per 250 square feet. The mixtures were composed of equal parts by weight of each of the three grasses used and seeded at the rate of 2 pounds per 250 square feet.

Ammonium sulfate was applied at the rate of one pound per 100 square feet before planting, also each spring and fall since. All plots were sprayed with amine 2, 4-D in the late spring of 1954 at the rate of one pound of actual acid per acre for control of broadleaf weeds which were principally dandelions and plantain.

Vary in Qualities
There is no one type or variety of lawn grass that is best for all situations. Some require more water than others. Some will tolerate shade better than others. They differ in their creeping tendencies, hence in ability to recover from scars after the neighborhood football tussle. Some sneak into the flower beds and shrubbery much worse than others. They differ in amount of cushioning effect, density, and color.

Lawns require time, effort and money to establish and maintain. Time and thought spent in selecting the best type of grass for the conditions should pay good dividends in satisfaction for years.

Labor Council Favors Pinball Licenses

Portland — (U.P.)—Portland Central Labor council reversed a previous decision last night and came out in favor of licensing pinball machines.

Teamsters, culinary workers and building service employees combined forces to put over the vote. They predicted the loss of hundreds of jobs if pinballs go.

Action of the council followed last week's appeals by the Oregon Licensed Beverage association and the Bowling Operator's Association, who predicted a drastic falloff of employment in their business if they lose pinball machines.

Filming of Movie Planned Near Bend

Bend — (U.P.)—United Artists plans to film a cinemascope western in the Benham falls area of the Deschutes river 10 miles south of here, according to Director Andre DeToth.

A company of more than 100 headed by Kirk Douglas will be brought up from Hollywood with shooting expected to get underway May 23.

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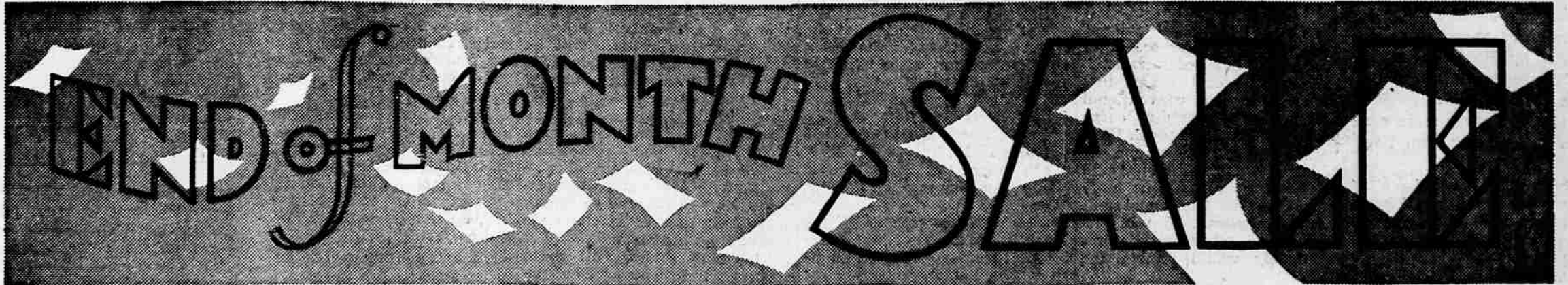
