

Red Demonstration Forecast by Hoover

Washington —(U.P.)— FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover warned Saturday that the Communist party will appropriate May Day for the furtherance of its "deceptive machinations."

Communist demonstrations can be expected everywhere, he said. The party will circulate special publications and unleash a barrage of hollow expressions about "peaceful co-existence" and "the peaceful path to socialism," he added.

Hoover cautioned the public not to be misled by any such "hollow" phrases and slogans.

He said that May Day presents an annual opportunity for the Reds to further their own aims through world-wide propaganda activity.

"It is in the interest of national security, therefore, that the public be alert to recognize and probably evaluate the enemy's techniques."

Chavez Says West 'Hungry' For Big Highway Program

Washington —(U.P.)— Chairman Dennis Chavez (D-N. M.) said Saturday a survey by the Senate Public Works committee showed Western states are "hungry" for a big highway building program, regardless of cost.

He said results of the survey, conducted by committee staff members in Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico, largely determined the scope of the \$21,700,000,000, five-year program recommended Friday by a highways subcommittee.

"We found the people out there not only are very highway conscious," Chavez said, "but highway improvements are in strong demand without reservations on cost."

Subcommittee Chairman Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) said meanwhile that the full committee will approve the bill Thursday and the Senate will pass it the following week.

The subcommittee rejected the administration's plan for a \$37,000,000,000 in new highways construction in the next 10 years and approved instead the \$21,700,000,000, five-year plan by a vote of 6 to 3. It includes \$400,000,000 for roads in national parks and forests.
