JAWBONE WASTES AWAY

The author of the chapter on Diseases of the Mouth, in the Cyclopaedia of Medicine, Surgery & Dentistry.

Specialists say a "chronic suppurative inflammation of the parodontium." Maybe that'll hold you until the author kindly explains that the parodontium is

"the alveolar process" (portion of jawbone containing the tooth sockets), the periodontal membrane (lining of tooth socket) and gingiva (the gum).

At one time or another recognized authorities have ascribed pyorrhea alveolaris to hereditary predisposition; salivary calculus (stone in the duct of a salivary gland); infection with staphylococcus, streptococcus, spirochete, entameba; trauma (injury) from uneven impact of the teeth during mastication.

Forty years ago the theory that pyorrhea was due to entameba infection gained wide acceptance and a good deal of ipecac or its active principle emetine was administered in injections or prescribed in dentifrices, but without benefit.

There were formerly some "pyorrhea specialists," dentists who contrived to become so known by the paying customers. These pyorrhea specialists readily nicked the ever gullible wisecracks two or three times as much as an honest dentist would charge for the same or very likely better treatment.

Pyorrhea specialists belong in the same category as arthritis specialists. But people with money to squander do just love the old hokum bunkum.

In the preceding piece about pyorrhea I quoted Louis I. Grossman, D. S., D. M. D., a recognized authority, who said:

Pyorrhea alveolaris denotes . . . manifestations which arise primarily from a functional atrophy of the alveolar process.

Atrophy of the alveolar process means the part of the jawbone containing the tooth sockets wastes away.

The jawbone withers, shrinks in size, becomes weaker and lighter in weight.

So does the skeleton, the frame, the stature of a person as age advances.

So do the bones of a youth or a vigorous adult who is confined to bed or chair for many months, or who for any reason doesn't get enough general exercise, such as daily walk of from a hundred yards to several miles. It's the way of all—bones.

We erudite anthropologists call it physical degeneration.

An important contributing cause of premature jaw bone atrophy is failure to give the jaws a reasonable amount of exercise every day—masticating food.

What do we feed our young children? Pap and pop.

An equally important contributing cause of pyorrhea is malnutrition—nutritional deficiency

through the years from early childhood up to and including this morning's dish of yummys.

I haven't said a word about calcium so far. But I intend to tell in a later piece what calcium has to do with pyorrhea, but the next article in this series should and will tell more about pap and pop.
