Eugene — (U.P.) — Jerry Ross hit two home runs and batted in six tallies to give the University of Oregon a 9-0 victory over Portland university here yesterday.

Oregon used three pitchers who gave up seven hits to the Portland squad.

Ross hit a grand slam homer in the first inning and also made two great catches to help Oregon shut out the Portlanders. He made one catch while rolling down a bank in deep left field.

Portland pitcher Bill Wiitala absorbed the loss.

The Ducks now take to the road for games with Washington State, Idaho, and Washington.

Indian, Trojan Athletes Pace Coast in Track

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Six athletes from University of Southern California and five from Stanford have turned in top performances in Pacific Coast Conference track and field competition this spring. Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt's office revealed today.

Best individual mark was SC's Ernie Shelton, with a high jump of six feet, 10 inches, an inch and a half from the world record and two inches from the magic seven-foot mark.

UCLA and Oregon cindermen contributed one mark each and shared another, and Washington State had the best performance in one event.

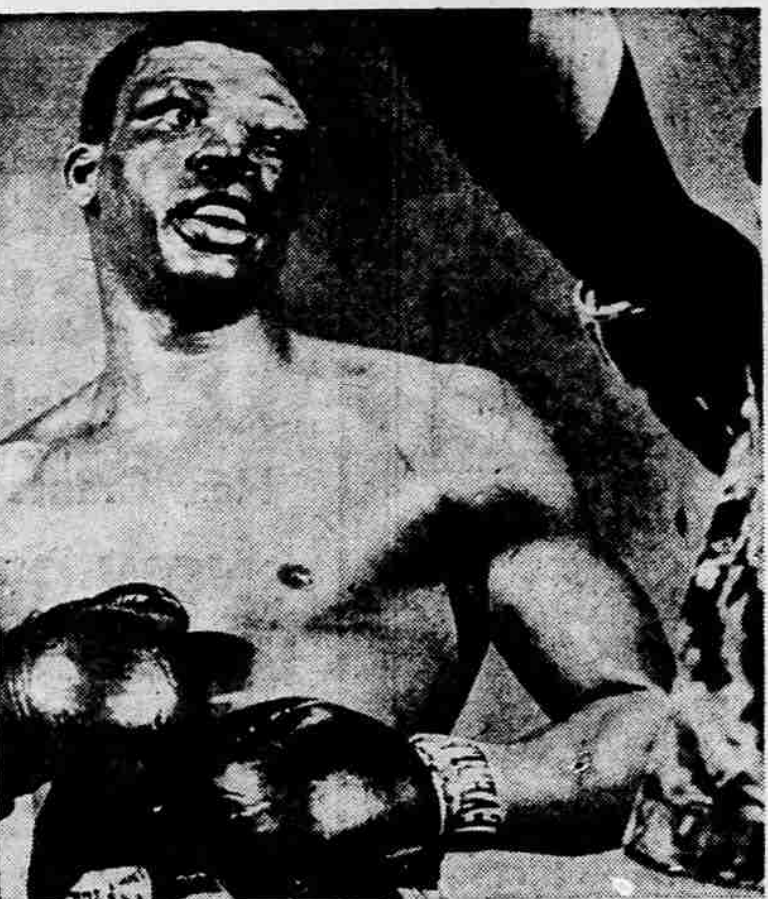

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Woods Get TKO Over P. Aguirre

Portland — (U.P.) — Bobby Woods of Spokane, Wash., hammered out a sixth-round TKO victory over Pete Aguirre of Los Angeles here last night before 1,153 fans in a Portland Boxing Club 10-round main event.

Woods weighed 136½ to 134 for Aguirre.

The favored Woods started taking command in the fifth round after shaking Aguirre up with body blows. In the sixth he caught Aguirre with three solid rights that jolted him and then moved in for the kill.

Aguirre's second throw in the towel, which was illegal, but referee Ralph Bruman awarded the contest to Woods at that point. There were no knock-downs.

Sugar Ray, Panter Mix

Detroit — (U.P.) — Sugar Ray Robinson, who figures he's rounding into shape faster than he anticipated, continues his comeback campaign tonight in a 10-rounder against hard-hitting Garth Panter.

And the 35-year-old Robinson is confident that Panter, 10 years his junior, will be another stepping stone in his bid for an eventual shot at the middle-weight title.

Robinson, who gave up the world's middleweight championship voluntarily in 1952 in favor of a song and dance career, launched his comeback here four months ago with a technical knockout of Joe Rindone.

He's shooting for a crack at his old title, now held by Carl (Bobo) Olson. But he's not going to tackle Olson until he convinces himself he's ready.

Robinson, who has lost only four fights in a career that started 15 years ago, has fought four times since coming out of voluntary retirement.

His only loss was to Ralph (Tiger) Jones. He blamed that loss on not being far enough advanced to tackle a fighter of Jones' caliber.
