Graduate Nurses Do Field Work With Department

Two graduate nurses, one a faculty member of the University of Oregon Medical school, nursing division, in Portland, are spending several weeks in Jackson county observing and doing field work with the Jackson County Public Health department. In addition, a third medical school faculty member will spend tomorrow here.

Miss Eva Davis of the medical school is spending three months in the county in preparation for recommending changes in the curriculum of the nursing school. After the curriculum changes, the school's graduate nurses will be accredited to take public health nursing positions without the additional year of training required in the past.

The change in accreditation will become effective in 1956, it is stated. Miss Davis is a trained public health nurse, and her work with the local department is considered in the nature of a refresher course.

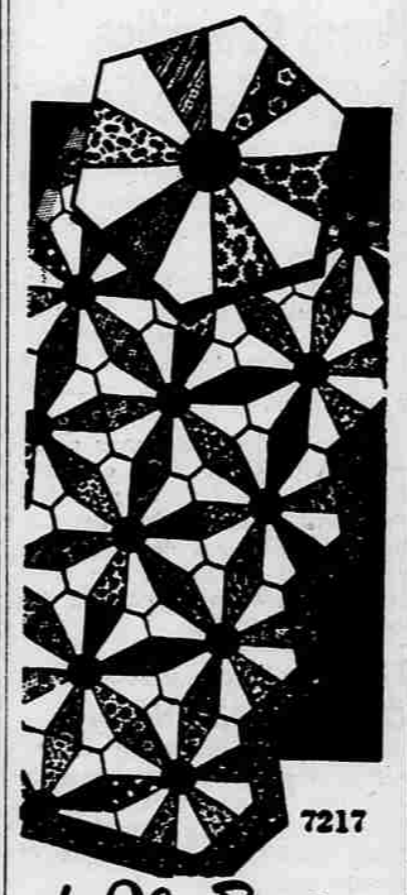
