Dale Long Spurs Pirate Triumph Over Braves; Starts Triple Play

Brooklyn —(U.P.)—Don Newcombe, the husky Negro pitching star of the Brooklyn Dodgers who was suspended yesterday for insubordination, was reinstated today after a conference with Vice-President E. J. (Buzz) Bavasi.

Newcombe was suspended yesterday when he refused to pitch batting practice before the Dodgers' game against the Cardinals. While the suspension lasted only one day, it cost him more than \$100 in salary. Bavasi said there would be "further penalties."

Dale Long, victim of one of baseball's most bizarre experiments, was in another rare position today: He could say "I told you so" to General Manager Branch Rickey of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Four years ago, Rickey decided Long couldn't make the big league grade as a first baseman and announced he was converting him to a left handed catcher. The move defied tradition because baseball men insisted there just "couldn't be such an animal." Long agreed but went along with the experiment.

It failed but Long still thought he could make good as a first sacker and today he's proving his point with a .364 batting average that's a major factor in the Pirates' sudden emergence as respectable citizens in the National League.

The 29-year-old 210-pounder from Green Bay, Wis., capped the comeback Thursday when he drove in six runs with three doubles and a sacrifice fly and started a triple play as the Pirates beat the Milwaukee Braves, 9-4. The victory was the fifth straight for the Pirates—second longest of the Rickey regime—and their eighth in 11 games. They'll equal the Rickey regime record of six wins in a row if they beat the New York Giants tonight.

Long, who has three triples and five doubles among his 16 blows this season, started his great day Thursday by driving in the first Pittsburgh run with a sacrifice fly in the first inning. In the fifth, he doubled to drive in two more runs and in the sixth he lashed another double with the bases filled to drive in three more.

Triple Play
Then, in the seventh, his 6-foot, 4 1/2 inches were put to good use when he leaped to spear a line drive by Eddie Mathews and start the season's first triple play. Long threw to Dick Groat, covering second, for a second out and took the shortstop's throw to first to complete the triple killing. Nelson King received credit for his first win with the aid of Vernon Law's relief.

The Giants downed the Chicago Cubs, 6-3, and the Detroit Tigers defeated the Boston Red Sox, -2, in the only other games.

Chan Harper Takes Lead In Colonial

Fort Worth, Tex. —(U.P.)—Chandler Harper, who builds golf courses and golf clubs as part of his 21-year career as a touring tournament golfer, usually is regarded as a "pitch and putt" man in tourney play.

His last two tournament triumphs—14 months apart—were in the 1954 Texas Open and the Virginia Beach Open two weeks ago. Both were over short courses, where the premium was on short iron and putter proficiency.

But, today as the rich \$25,000 Colonial National Invitation golf tournament moved into its second round over the long, torturous 7,035-yard Colonial Country Club course, the man in front of the pack by a stroke was Harper.

The drawing Virginian, who divides his time between a golf course he is building in Portsmouth, Va., and a club manufacturing concern in Chattanooga, Tenn., was the only man in the 47-player field to conquer Colonial's sun-seared layout Thursday as he posted a 35-34—69 despite an erratic game off the tee.

That gave him a slim one-stroke edge over defending champion Johnny Palmer of Charlotte, N.C., and Jack Fleck of Davenport, Iowa, who shot identical 36-34—70s.

And, he was two strokes ahead of a trio made up of Tommy Bolt of Houston, Tex., Ed Oliver of Lemont, Ill., and Leo Bisgetti of Sandusky, Ohio, who were bracketed at 71.

Arch Moore Will Battle Bobo Olson

New York —(U.P.)—It's only seven weeks to June 22, the day lightweight champion Archie Moore puts his crown on the line against middleweight King Carl (Bobo) Olson, but the old battler claimed today he won't have much trouble losing 21 1/2 pounds by then.

Moore, who scaled a beefy 196 1/2 pounds for his bout with Cuban heavyweight Nino Valdes in Las Vegas, Nev., Monday night, agreed to meet Olson Thursday, but only after the International Boxing Club promised him a heavyweight title bout in September.

Terms for the Moore-Olson bout have not been completed, but they will meet at the Polo Grounds with Olson's title not at stake. If, however, Olson defeats the 38-year-old "wonder man" of the ring, he'll have to relinquish his middleweight title.
