

# Mrs. Burba Honored For Blood Work Here

Mrs. J. W. Burba, chairman for blood procurement for the Red Cross here, is being urged to accept a nomination to the coordinating council of the regional blood center, it was reported today.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the local Red Cross chapter yesterday, a letter was read urging her to accept the nomination, and commending her for her outstanding work locally in the blood program. This has attracted the attention of the regional center and prompted the nomination, the letter said.

## Needs Nominating Group

At yesterday's meeting, Mrs. Frank Fairweather accepted the chairmanship of the nominating committee to present names of prospective new board members. Mrs. Fairweather also was the principal speaker at the meeting, telling of the work of the home service section of the chapter. She traced the development of this phase of the work, and told how "home service" has as its primary responsibility service to men and women in military service, and to their families.

Some 300 messages are handled every minute around the clock by this service nationally, she said, all for military personnel on duty or their families. The local chapter spent \$4,000 of its budget last year for home service messages, she added. Mrs. Fairweather explained that strict requirements as to how home service funds are to be used make it necessary to refuse many requests for service, and that a great deal of misunderstanding frequently results.

## First Aid Classes

First aid chairman Leroy Williams told the board that two first aid classes are now under way at Timber Products company, and that it is planned to have all personnel there qualified in first aid soon.

Mrs. Helen Wilson, chapter secretary, said that home nursing classes being conducted at Gilman's dairy are progressing satisfactorily, and she urged anyone interested in the classes to get in touch with the Red Cross office. Enrollments are still being accepted.

Eugene Thorndike, chairman of the chapter, presided at the meeting.

## Natural Resources Given Emphasis in Kiwanis Talk

county's natural resources, probably 90 per cent of you would not be here today," E. K. Peterson, district forester here for the Bureau of Land Management, declared Wednesday in a talk to Medford Kiwanians at Rogue Valley Country club.

Peterson spoke at the service club's luncheon and presented a film, "Promise of Trees," in connection with National Conservation Week.

In the final analysis, it is the landowner, himself, who must practice the conservation, the forester stressed. Of the timbered land in Jackson county, 40 per cent is in private ownership, Peterson reported. He said that the remaining 60 per cent is under jurisdiction of the BLM and the U.S. Forest Service.

Of the private timber 45 per cent is under long term forest management, or extensive tree farming, according to Peterson. All resources of the BLM and

Forest Service, timber, forage, grass, are under sustained yield programs.

## Cut Exceeds Growth

In discussing the future of the timber industry, Peterson pointed out that more logs are being cut in the county than can be grown each year. He pointed to an annual cut of 450,000,000 board feet in logs while the allowable cut should be about 250,000,000. There is going to have to be a cut in log production for sustained yield, Peterson brought out, and he mentioned the need of more manufacturing locally to "take up the slack."

The film concerned tree farms and manufacture of wood products, particularly the making of paper.
