### Teenage Daughters Ashamed Of Home

Teenagers are very self-conscious about the appearance of their home. There is no reason for parents to permit the situation to get to the point where their children are ashamed to have their friends come to their home.

(Q) "We have three children, 16, 18, and 19 years old. The two older ones are working, while the younger one is still in school. They all live at home. Our home is old and in need of repairs. The children are ashamed to bring their friends to our home because they say their friends all have better homes. When I speak to my husband about fixing anything, he always says, 'You fix it.' I think that is a man's work, and besides, I haven't the money to fix things if I tried. He makes a good salary but he won't give me any money for the house and I never have anything left after buying food and a few clothes for myself. What would you suggest that I do? I don't want my daughters meeting the boys on the street or at dance halls, but it isn't fair to keep them from having dates either."

(A) It certainly is not fair to put your daughters in such a position that they are embarrassed to bring their friends home. Nor is it fair to them to give the boys the bad impression about them they are certain to get when they meet them on the streets or in public dance halls. Today there are such quick and easy ways to spruce up a house and furniture that even a complete amateur can do a good job. Just read the directions given and you will have no trouble.

As for the cost of materials, could you not ask your children who are working to contribute part of it? Then, if your husband refuses to give you the money you need, try giving him cheap food and save something from the food allowance. ## Need for Hospital Seen for Ashland

Ashland — Southern Jackson county does not have adequate hospital service and the proposed new hospital in Medford will not change the situation materially, a five-man committee has reported to the board of directors of the Valley View Hospital district.

The committee, working at the request of the hospital board but as an independent group, said a modern, 30-bed hospital is necessary to provide proper service. Serving on the committee to survey hospital needs were Clint Baughman, chairman, Gerald Wenner, Graham Dean, Orson N. Wray, and Lloyd Selby.

The committee said its month-long survey included investigation of the condition of Ashland General hospital, a study of the findings of Stanford Research Institute, which recently investigated hospital needs throughout the county, an interview with

George M. Shiffer of the state board of health, and an inquiry into plans for the proposed Medford hospital.

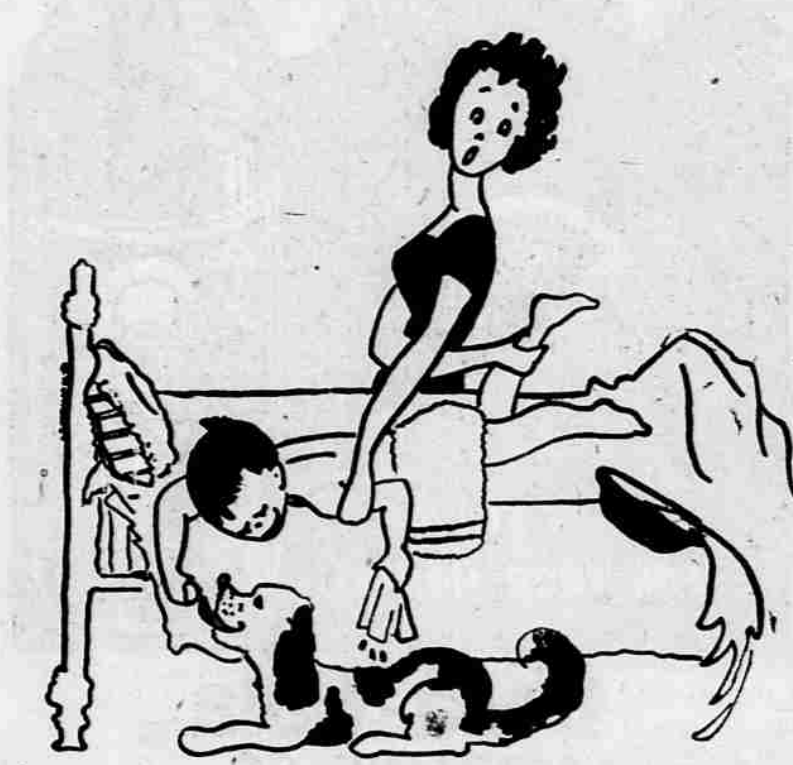
