Three More Polio Cases Listed in Idaho

Boise (U.P.)—Three more cases of polio among Salk-vaccinated children were listed in Idaho today.

The latest cases brought up to 15 the number of children listed as polio victims since April 26. As in the cases of the first 12 children—including two who died—the three cases reported yesterday were inoculated with vaccine ordered by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and shipped by Cutter Laboratories in Berkeley, Calif.

All Cutter vaccine was withdrawn April 27.
