The fire started in this building and quickly spread to adjoining buildings. At least four large buildings were destroyed with damages estimated at a million dollars. All available firemen, off duty and on, plus five units from St. Paul answered the top alarm as the blaze spread to 14 rooftops in a four-square-block-area. Three firemen were injured in the battle.

Racing Regulations Signed by Patterson

Salem —(U.P.)— Three measures designed to strengthen enforcement of racing regulations in Oregon have been signed by Gov. Paul L. Patterson.

Oregon law already requires the licensing of trainers, drivers and jockeys. House bill 425 signed today would also require the licensing of horse owners, dog owners, exercise boys, agents, jockeys' agents, stable foremen, grooms, valets, veterinarians, horse-shoers, stewards, stable watchmen, starters, timers, judges and others acting as

officials at any race meet, including all employees of the pari-mutuel department.

Another act gives the racing commission the authority of law to enforce its regulations. A third act gives the commission authority to oust persons from a racetrack when found to be illegally making book or "touting."

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129 Communicable Diseases Listed

A total of 129 cases of communicable diseases was reported in Jackson county during the week ending May 6, according to the county health department's weekly report.

Communicable illnesses were most prevalent in Ashland (52) during the week, with Medford close behind (48).

Measles, 69 cases, continued to lead the list. Twenty-nine cases of the disease were reported in Ashland, 21 in Medford, 14 in Talent, two at Applegate, and one each in Rogue River, Butte Falls, and Jacksonville.

Thirty-six cases of influenza were reported. Ashland had 15, and there were 13 in Medford, seven in Phoenix, and one at Eagle Point.

The list also included eight cases of mumps, with five in Ashland and three in Medford; five cases of pneumonia, with two each in Ashland and Medford and one at Eagle Point; four cases of scarlet fever, with three in Medford and one at Eagle Point; four cases of chickenpox in Medford; one case of mumps-encephalitis in Ashland, and one case each of amoebic dysentery and infectious hepatitis in Medford.

Census of Business Returns Processed

Portland — Some 20,000 reports in the 1954 census of business, manufactures and mineral industries are being processed in the Portland office of the Bureau of the Census, according to Census Supervisor Roy W. Murphy.

Completion of the job is expected in about three weeks, by which time it is expected that an additional 2,000 reports will have been received and processed.

The facts obtained through the census will be used by business men in making decisions on plant location, product development, marketing channels, sales quotas, advertising campaigns, and other similar matters.

Registered letters are being sent to establishments which have not filed reports in compliance with the census law, notifying them that the reports must be returned promptly in accordance with the law.

Nationalist China Won't Accept Cease Fire Rule

Taipei, Formosa —(U.P.)— Premier O. K. Yui said yesterday Nationalist China would never accept a cease fire in the Formosa Strait as long as the Communists dominate mainland China.

"We will not stop in our efforts to regain the mainland," the Premier said. "Until that day we will not be content to remain on an isolated island."

Reedsport, Ore. —(U.P.)— James Peck, 20, who became lost while picking ferns near Smith river Sunday, found his way out of the woods Monday after a search party failed to find him. Peck said he built a fire and rested during the night after losing a trail.

Tigard Youth's Gun Discharges in Fall

Tigard, Ore. —(U.P.)— Glenn Joseph Payne, 17-year-old Tigard youth, was wounded in the stomach Monday evening when he tripped in a field near his house and his .22-caliber rifle accidentally discharged, state police said. Payne was taken to St. Vincent's hospital for surgery.

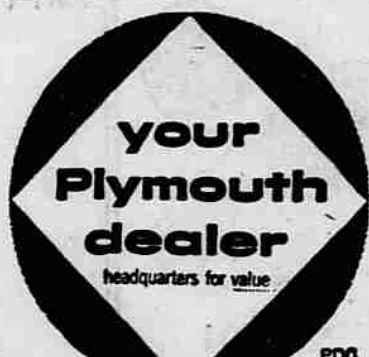
