Hollywood — (U.P.) — The newest singing star to warm up for success is a pretty 10-year-old brunette who still plays with dolls and spurns a chance for free voice lessons at home.

Rosemary is a star of CBA radio and TV and Paramount movies with younger Betty Clooney behind. Now the junior member of the Clooney clan, half-sister Gail, is following in their footsteps with an early start of her own.

"But they don't give me lessons," Gail insisted today. "They let me sing the way I want to." Comeback at 10.

Gail's singing career started at age 6 when she sang "She's a Lady" with Sister Betty on the Robert Q. Lewis show. She then retired and emerged this year at the ripe age of 10 on Rosemary's radio program.

Rosemary and Gail recently recorded two children's hymns. This summer they plan an album of children's records.

Gail was sitting in the den of Rosemary's Beverly Hills home today and appeared more absorbed in raffle tickets she's selling for her grammar school than in her first interview. Gail has lived with Rosemary and her husband, Jose Ferrer, for two years because Gail's mother had to tour with sister Betty.

"We're happy to have Gail. Joe loves her," Rosemary explained. "They play chess together."

"I keep her work to bare minimum while she's in school. I think work is fine for a child if done in moderation. It's wonderful experience, even if she doesn't use it later on. Professionalism is good to know."

Keep Balance

Rosemary and Betty started to sing together occasionally when they were aged 6 and 3. They began professionally on the radio at 16 and 13. All three girls have "a family resemblance" in their voices, Rosemary thinks. Gail hopes to be both a singer and a dancer when she grows up.

After two years of living with the Ferrers, Gail is calm about celebrities who stream through the house. She didn't bat an eyelash today when Marlene Dietrich swept in to give Rosemary a pink negligee to take when she opens at the Sands hotel in Las Vegas tomorrow.

"My manager suggested Gail do a duet with me on opening night but I said no," Rosemary said firmly. "That's no place for a child."
