

Medford Gains 14 Berths in State Track Meet; Scores 171

Grants Pass Is 2nd; 4 Schools To State

Medford's Black Tornado will go into the Oregon state track meet at Corvallis next week well-manned for its role as defending Class A champion.

The Tornado emerged from a tent city it pitched on the Southern Oregon college field yesterday and went out into cold, blustery and rainy weather in the District 3 Class A high school meet to qualify men for 14 berths in the state encounter.

As expected, Medford took team honors with 171 points as 11 boys in 12 events won the right to represent the school at Corvallis. Grants Pass took second place with 103 6-7. Third was Ashland with 57 6-7. Other team totals were Klamath Falls 51 5-7, Crater 19 5-7, Eagle Point 13, Henley 6 and Phoenix 1 6-7.

4 Schools Qualify
Only four schools will send men to the state hassle. Ashland was a surprise, qualifying six men for six berths. Grants Pass and Klamath Falls each will send four men north to vie in four events. First and second places were needed to earn the Corvallis jaunt.

Medford failed to qualify in only the discus and pole vault, with failure of Lew Breazeale to even place in the vault the biggest Tornado disappointment of the day.

Taking first places in six of the 14 events, the Tornado established its team lead early in the day-long affair. Sophomore Neil Plumley won the shot put with a 45-foot 9-inch cast and Mike Hawkins took the broad jump with 21 3-4. Another sophomore, Eldon Francis, took his specialty, the javelin, with a 186-foot effort and his teammate, Mel Morgan, took second in the event.

Larson Takes Hights
Still another sophomore, Wally Larson, came through for Medford in the hurdles. He took the highs in good style at 15.5 but in the lows missed his stride on the third barrier and had to fight hard to beat out a mate, Bron Oglesby, for second place behind Scott Hancock, Klamath Falls.

Don Crowl took the quarter-mile for Medford in a photo-finish, edging Tom Farrell of Klamath Falls. Crowl has had a game leg and the lack of work affected his endurance. He nearly ran out of gas 50-yards from the finish but had enough to win.

Another Tornado one - two punch was felt in the half-mile when Jeff Williams won in 2:05.7 and was followed by Jack Pool.

Dan Morris, Medford, was second to Ashland's speedy long-striding Stewart Baker, in both the 100 and 220-yard dash. Glenn Allison in fourth place going into the final turn of the final lap, put on a great finishing kick and took second in the mile. Bud Kastner was Medford's other qualifier in the high jump.

Ashland Wins Relay
Ashland beat Medford in the relay as Baker ran a fine anchor lap to overcome a Tornado lead. Crowl, who should have his full

New Records Set At Meets In Class A

Springfield, Ore. — (UP) — Five new records were set in a driving rain here Friday night when North Bend edged Eugene by less than one point for the District 4 high school track title.

North Bend's winning score was 68 1-3 to 67 2-3 for Eugene. Roseburg was a close third with 64 1-3.

John Johnson, Marshfield, ran the century in 10 flat, breaking the old district record of 10.2. Mark Robbins, Roseburg, state mile champion, cracked the old district mark of 4:27.5 by one-tenth of a second.

Other records fell to Willard Reeve, North Bend, shot put, 54 feet, 11 1/2 inches; Hodgey Shepman, North Bend, broad jump, 22 feet, 9 inches; Bill Henderson, Drain, Javelin, 175 feet, 2 inches.

Corvallis — (UP) — Albany scored 121 1-3 points here Friday to win the Class A division of the District 5 high school track meet.

Albany qualified six individuals and a relay team for the state championship next week end.

Following Albany in second place with 70 points, Lebanon had 64 1-7.

A new district record was set by Bob Amble, Albany, who tossed the discus 169 feet, 4 inches.

Dave Connor, Philomath, set a new high hurdles mark at 16.2, and Leroy Mutschler, also Philomath, completed the mile run in 4:58, four seconds better than the old district record.

Rogue River Wins Class B, Qualifys 11 For State Meet

Rogue River qualified 11 athletes and a relay team for the state track and field meet at Corvallis next Friday and Saturday by winning the Class B district meet here yesterday afternoon with 169 points.

Malin scored 103 points for second place in the district meet at Medford High school's stadium. Malin qualified five boys as well as the mile relay team.

Merrill scored 73 points, qualifying four for the state meet, while Jacksonville tallied 64 points and qualified three. Bonanza, with 15 points, failed to qualify anyone for state competition.

First and second place winners qualify for the state meet, and third place winners are alternates.

Jack Herburger and Don Doolittle qualified for the shot put from Rogue River. They tossed the shot 44-6 and 41-4 1/2, respectively. Bill Heidrick qualified in the javelin with a toss of 173 feet, eight inches.

Others from Rogue River to qualify for state competition were Bobby Hoover, who placed second in the 100-yard dash; Lawrence Wagner, who finished second in the mile run; Harold Moore, who tied with Rod Lyon of Malin for first place in the pole vault; Gary Phillips, second in 440-yard dash; Gary Stewart, second in the high jump; Herburger, first in the discus; Ted Stanfield, who ran the low hurdles in 21.4; Hoover, second in the 220-yard dash; and the mile relay team, which finished second.

Ron Muir of Jacksonville, ran the mile in 4:57.7 to qualify in that event, while Fred DeVos, who ran the 440 in 54.4 and Dick Sanford, who high jumped 5 feet, 4 1/2 inches, also qualified. Herburger of Rogue River and Rod Lyon of Malin were the only double winners in the meet yesterday. Herburger won the shot and discus, and Lyon won the pole vault and high hurdles.

Next business on the Southern Oregon Conference baseball agenda is the make up of three rained out scuffles and even they may not settle the titular issue.

The close, tense scrap for District 6 A-1 and conference buntings continued its tightening trend in Friday. Medford, pouring across eight runs in a single innin., bowled over league-leading, Grants Pass for the third time in four games. The count was 9 to 6. Klamath Falls pushed back into second spot in the circuit with a double triumph over Ashland, 7 to 6 and 4 to 1.

Grants Pass holds the lead by a half-game over Klamath. Medford, with more victories but also more setbacks than the Pelicans, is in third position, trailing Klamath in percentage points.

Race Could Deadlock
The Medford Black Tornado has one contest to make up with KF while the Cavemen of Grants Pass have two to play with the Pels.

Report at the district track meet at Ashland yesterday was that Klamath would come to Medford on Monday for one diamond make-up while Grants Pass is slated to go to Klamath Falls on Wednesday. Medford coach Alex McDonald could not be contacted last night for confirmation concerning a Monday game.

Grants Pass can clinch the pennant by sweeping the Pel conflicts. Klamath Falls will have to win all three of the make-ups to get the mantle without further play-off. A KF-GP split and a Medford win over Klamath would knot the Tornado and Cavemen in the final standings while two wins by KF over Grants Pass and a Medford win over KF would deadlock the Tornado and Pels. A KF-GP split and KF win over Medford would tie Klamath and Grants Pass.

Two Medford home runs featured the Friday struggle at Grants Pass. The first was a left field smash by Frank Rector. The other, by Ed Reinking, came in the Tornado's big eight-run fourth batting turn and was his second in two games with GP.

Reinking also cracked a single in the big canto and other hits were blasted by Paul Eckel, Jim Owsley and Larry Perkins. A hit batter and three errors contributed to Medford run-making. McCulloch on mound.

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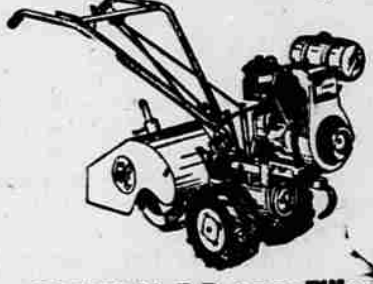
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
