Rookie Elston Howard was bruised and bloodied in a fifth-inning collision with the left fielder Saturday but the injuries lost a lot of their sting when he blasted a two-run triple with two out in the ninth inning to give the Yankees a 7-6 victory over the Tigers.

Howard's triple, his second of the game, came off Al Aber, who relieved Tiger starter Billy Hoft after Mickey Mantle had singled home pinch runner Frank Leja to make the score 6-5.

Two Triples
Installed in the cleanup spot Saturday, Howard responded first with a triple in the third and again with his game-winning triple in the ninth. He suffered bruises on his right hand and elbow and on his left knee while chasing Al Kaline's double during a three-run rally by Detroit in the fifth.

That three-run spurge chased starter Bob Grim and put the Tigers ahead, 6-4, the score remaining that way until the ninth. Jim Konstanty, the third Yankee pitcher, was credited with the victory.

Jackie Jensen smashed his second homer of the game with a man on base in the 13th inning to lead the Red Sox to a 3-1 triumph over the Athletics. Jensen's payoff homer came off reliever Johnny Sain, who had taken over for starter Art Ditmar in the 10th.

Boston went ahead in the fourth on Jensen's first homer but the Athletics tied the score in the fifth off starter Leo Kiley on three straight singles. Russ Kemmerer relieved Tom Hurd in the 11th and picked up his first victory of the year.

Two Postponed
Rain caused postponement of the Cleveland-Washington and Chicago-Baltimore games.

A seven-run rally in the seventh inning plus the seven-hit pitching of southpaw Johnny Podres featured Brooklyn's 13-2 triumph over Cincinnati. Carl Furillo's grand-slam homer off Bob Hooper highlighted the Dodgers' seven-run rally and Duke Snider smashed his 10th homer of the season with one on in the same frame. Podres lost his shutout in the ninth when Wally Post hammered a two-run homer.

Bob Rush's seven-hit pitching gave the Cubs an 8-0 victory and ended a four-game Giants' winning streak. The Cubs jumped on southpaw Johnny Antonelli for three runs in the fifth after he had retired the first 12 men to face him. Antonelli was yanked after he walked Harry Chiti, forcing in a run.

Add More Runs
Pinch hitter Ted Tappe's single off reliever Marv Grissom drove in two more runs. A single by Eddie Miksis produced another pair of runs in the seventh and the Cubs scored two more runs in the eighth when Alvin Dark dropped Tappe's pop fly with the bases full.

The Milwaukee Braves overcame a three-run deficit to hand the Philadelphia Phillies their 12th straight loss, 5-4. Eddie Mathew's fifth inning homer off loser Jack Meyer proved to be the winning blow after Del Crandall's double with the bases full tied the score in the fourth. Ernie Johnson relieved Warren Spahn when the Phils scored all their runs in the third and was the winner.

Brooks Lawrence shut out the Pittsburgh Pirates with four hits in pitching the St. Louis Cardinals to a 6-0 victory in a night game at St. Louis. The Negro right-hander struck out five and walked only one. Ken Boyer homered for the Redbirds.

Seattle Wins, 5-3; Sacs Beat Seals, 7-2

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — First baseman Harvey Zernia Saturday rapped three hits in four trips to the plate, including a double, to lead Seattle to a 5-3 win over Los Angeles. The victory evened the series at 3-3.

Zernia's double in the Wrigley field game before 5,782 fans was the only extra-base hit the Rainiers were able to get. Los Angeles scored two of its runs on two bases-empty homers.

Both hurlers went the distance and performed about equally. Vic Lombardi (4-2), who emerged the winner, gave up nine hits, struck out one and walked three. John Pyecha (0-1), the loser, gave up eight hits.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Sacramento chased over seven runs in the third inning, featured by Pitcher Bud Daley's two singles, to score a 7-2 victory over San Francisco yesterday and even the Pacific Coast League series at 3-3.

Besides sparking the Sacs at the plate, Daley set the Seals down with eight hits before a crowd of 1,930 and joined Al Gettel of Oakland as the only six-game winner in the PCL. Daley has lost three.

The 22-year-old left-hander singled off Steve Nagy (2-5) early in the wild third and scored the tying run when Reliever Jim Walsh uncorked a wild pitch. Later in the frame he drove in the final two runs with a single off Maurice Fisher.

Sacramento put together six singles, a walk and a wild pitch for its seven runs in the third.

San Diego — (U.P.) — Earl Rapp slammed his 11th homer of the season and drove in five runs Saturday as San Diego overcame Hollywood's early 8-2 lead and nipped the Stars, 10-9.

Rapp, who has driven in 49 runs in 39 games, collected two singles in addition to his homer to pace San Diego's 13-hit attack.

The win gave the Padres a 5-1 lead in the eight-game series which ends with today's double-header.

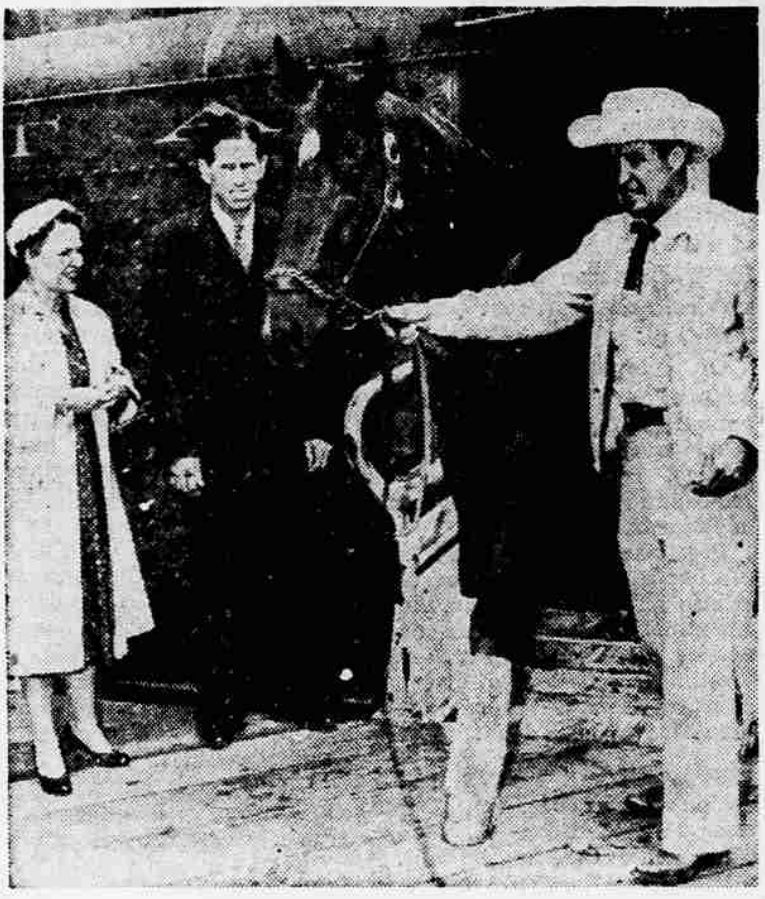

Ducks Drub OSC, 97 to 34; Bingham, Moad Both Second

Eugene — (U.P.) — University of Oregon trackmen bucked persistent rains to break three meet records and out-point Oregon State 97-34 in a Northern division track meet here Saturday.

The water-logged Oregon Frosh also dumped the Oregon State Rooks 75-48.

Bill Dellinger and Jim Bailey finished in a dead heat in the featured mile run, breaking the meet record with a clocking of 4:18.6. The NCAA mile champ and the Australian ran together for the last 100 yards of the race.

Ken Reiser of Oregon set a new mark in the two-mile, running it alone in 9:28.6.

A 50-foot shotgun heave, the best effort of his career, gave Oregon's Ben Lloyd a new meet record and right behind him was Jack Moad, who set a new school record last weekend at the Vancouver relays.

Oregon's Ed Bingham also hit his peak to date with a 209-foot javelin throw, but Oregon State's Jerry Church beat him with a toss of 212-feet, 3-inches.

The only other Beaver victors were Ernie Warren in the high hurdles and Ron Engle in the lows.

Jack Morris clipped off the 100 yard dash in 10 flat for the Oregon Frosh victory.

Santee Runs Mile In 4:06 At Fresno

Fresno, Calif. — (U.P.) — Wes Santee, the long-striding Kansan, failed in his bid for the four-minute mile again Saturday as he won the invitational mile in the 29th annual West Coast relays.

With a stiff 14-mile per hour wind, which has been following him around all spring and thwarting every record effort, Santee finished a good 30-yards ahead of Len Simpson of the San Francisco Olympic club—but found no solace in that.

This race was especially designed to give Santee a chance at the four-minute mile. He asked for and was given lane number three. Art Dalzell, a former Kansas teammate, ran most of the first three laps in front to break the wind; and a lad named Gene Jones of the Santa Clara Youth Center, ran along Santee's side shouting encouragement.

Fernando Ledesma, of USC, finished third and Jim Hunt of San Diego state, fourth. Dalzell and Jones failed to finish.

Santee had anticipated perfect weather here — and earlier in the week the forecaster had promised just that. But the temperature, which had been up around 90 all week, suddenly dropped to near 70 and the winds came up.

Talent Will Oppose Malin Monday; Bulldogs Top EP

Talent — Talent high's Bulldogs topped the Class A-2 Eagle Point baseball aggregation 4 to 1 here on Friday and today were awaiting their District 5B play-off engagement against Malin on Monday.
