## Teamsters Reject Trucker Wage Offer

Portland—(U.P.)—AFL teamsters here yesterday unanimously defeated a wage offer by trucking employers of 11 Western states, according to Clyde C. Crosby, international representative of the union.

About 1000 members voted against the employer's "final offer." Results of the downstate teamsters' vote were expected later.

The union, which has been negotiating with employer groups at Los Angeles, has sought a 10-cent hourly wage raise this year, and 8-cent raises for the following two years.

Teamsters have been offered a nine-cent boost, to be followed by nickel raises the next two years, or a nickel-an-hour raise each year for the next five years.

Union and employer officials will meet at Los Angeles tomorrow.

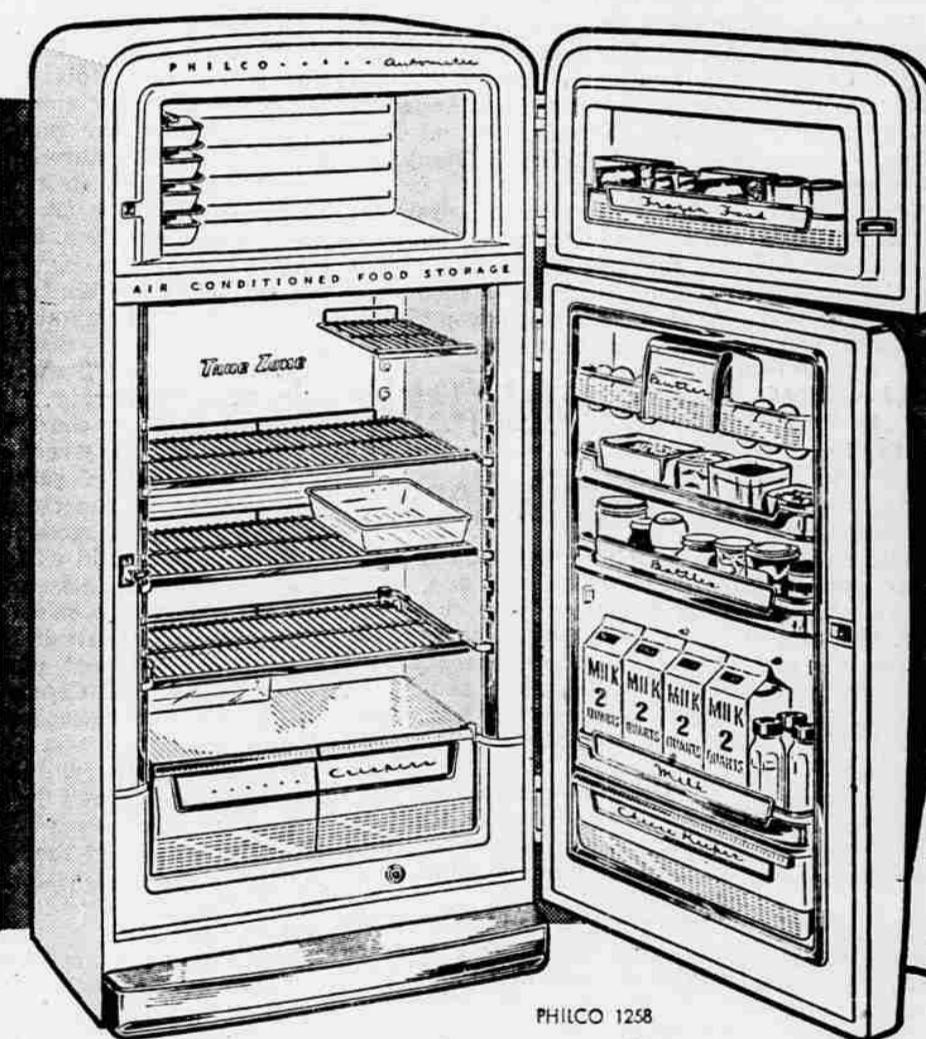

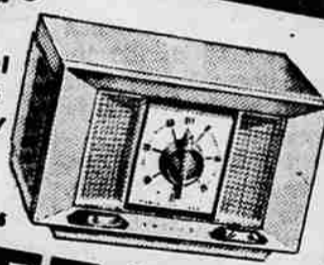

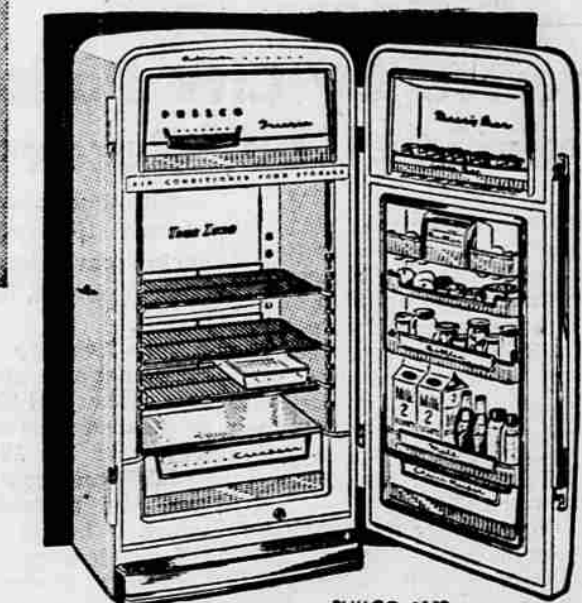
