Salem — The Medford Church of the Nazarene is the largest church of its denomination in Oregon, according to tabulations compiled here yesterday. The Medford church ranked first in average Sunday school attendance during the year ended May 1, with an average of 405 pupils. It was followed closely by Salem, Eugene and Portland churches.

The figures were announced at a pre-conference session of the denomination's district assembly. Other business of the pre-conference sessions included meetings of various committees and boards.

Business Under Way

The official business of the district assembly got under way this morning. Official delegates of the Medford Church of the Nazarene to the assembly are Mrs. Ella Herman, Mrs. Mattie House, Mrs. Madelyn Hurn, Mrs. Lulu Larson, Mrs. Orpha Leschensky, and Ed Taylor. They will remain in Salem until the close of the assembly, at noon Friday.

All-time church records have been set by the Medford church during the past year, according to a report made to the congregation last week by the Rev. R. W. Hurn, pastor. At that time, a goal of an additional Medford Church of the Nazarene was approved for the coming year.

Attorney Named To Defend Youth

Astoria — (U.P.) — Attorney Gordon Sloan was named today to defend 19-year-old William E. Kent, an AWOL Army private, on a child stealing charge in connection with the 40-hour disappearance of seven-year-old Tommy Woodard.

Kent appeared in Justice Court here yesterday and bail was set at \$25,000, after the charge was filed by District Attorney Thomas E. Brownhill.

Tommy, who disappeared Sunday afternoon, was found early yesterday and directed searchers to a tent where Kent was camped.

Sheriff Paul Kearney said he would question the boy further after the lad had a chance to rest.

Police in Portland said Kent had a juvenile record there. When arrested yesterday Kent said he had only \$20 left out of some \$700 reenlistment money. He said he had been AWOL from Fort Campbell, Ky., since May 10.

Ambulances Sent Prior To Accident

Johannesburg, South Africa — (U.P.) — Ambulances with sirens wide open sped toward the scene of a train crash Tuesday, minutes before the accident happened.

Station masters at two stations about 50 miles from here realized they had sent two freight trains heading toward each other on the same track but were powerless to stop them.

So they called for ambulances and awaited the crash.

One man was hospitalized with minor head injuries but everyone else jumped clear before the head-on crash which telescoped several freight cars.

Bill Allows Indians To Lease Their Land

Washington — (U.P.) — The Senate Interior Committee yesterday approved a bill allowing Indians to lease their lands for oil or mining expeditions and other purposes.

The leases would have to be granted on competitive bids with the approval of the secretary of interior.

The committee also approved a bill requiring an affirmative vote of Indians before law enforcement on their reservations could be ceded by the federal government to the states.

The bill would amend a 1953 law which conferred civil and criminal jurisdiction over Indian reservations to the states of California, Minnesota, Nebraska, Oregon and Wisconsin. The measure would require a plebiscite on the switch at the request of the tribal council or 20 per cent of the adults on the reservation.

Non-Supporting Dads To Face Prosecution

Ontario, Ore. — (U.P.) — E. Otis Smith, Malheur county district attorney, said yesterday he intends to prosecute fathers guilty of non-support.

Smith said he knew of 32 cases of "flagrant violations" of support orders, all involving non-support of dependent children. He said he plans to take legal action as fast as possible.

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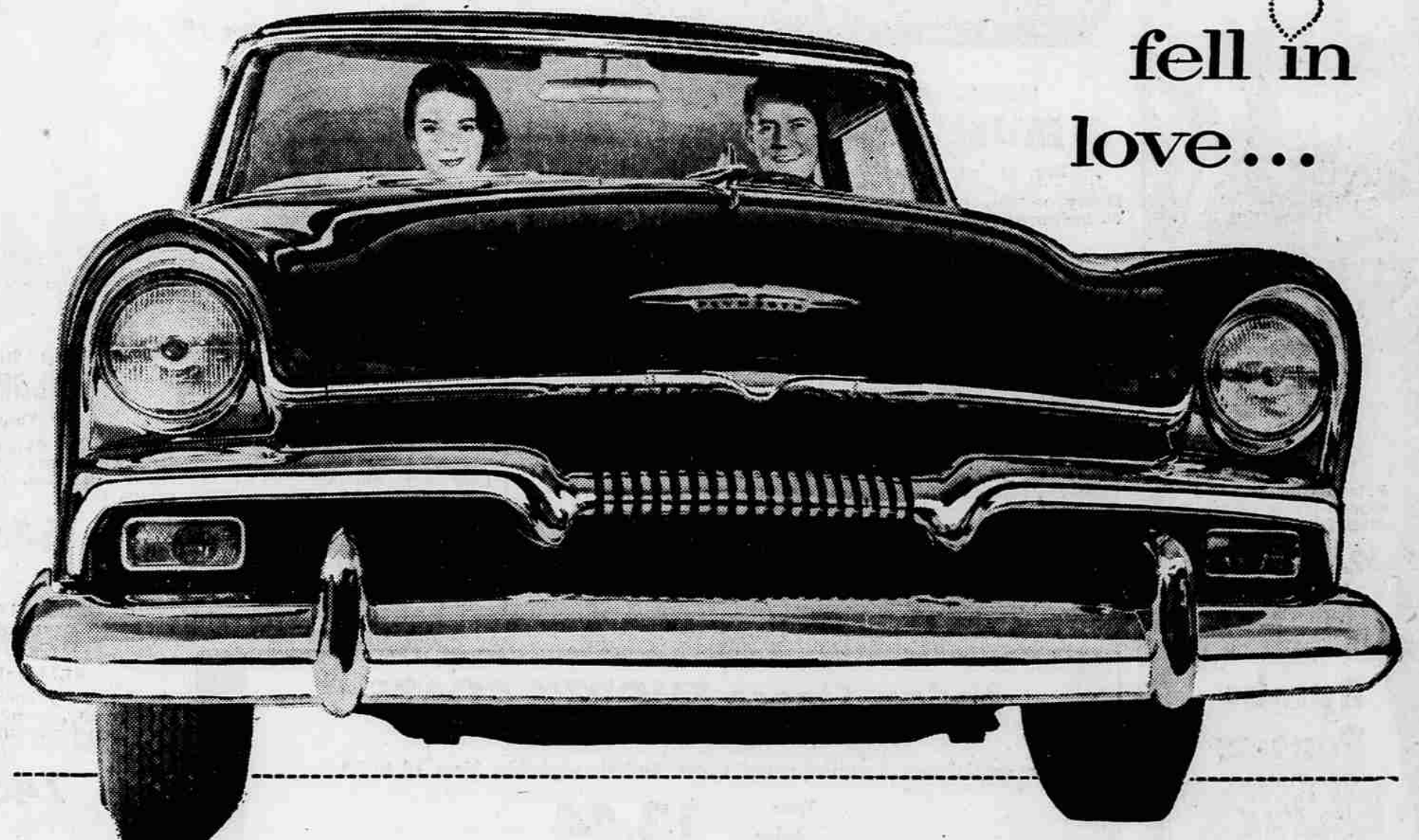

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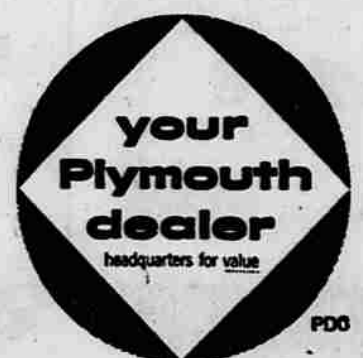
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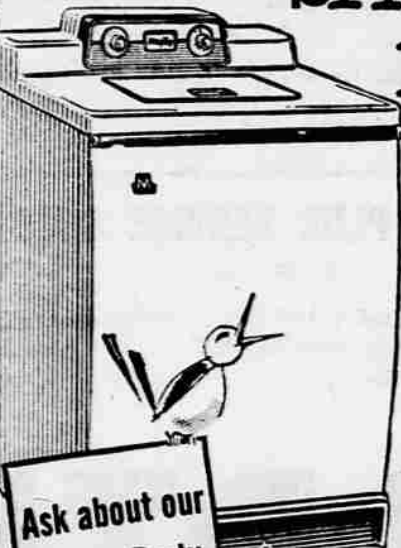
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
