Cudd, Yost And Partners Beat British

St. Andrews, Scotland — (U.P.) — The U.S. Walker Cup golfers took a 4-0 lead against a stubborn British team today by sweeping all of the four 36-hole foursomes matches as the international series began in bitterly cold weather on the ancient St. Andrews Course.

The competition will end tomorrow with eight 36-hole singles matches. The foursomes sweep virtually assured the Yanks of winning the coveted amateur trophy for the 14th time in 15 tries. They need to win only three of the singles to clinch it.

Harvie Ward of San Francisco and Don Cherry of San Antonio, Tex., were 2 down to Britain's No. 1 team of Joe Carr and Ronnie White after 27 holes. But the U.S. pair came back to win, 1 up.

That was the first and toughest match. The other three American pairs quickly followed with easier triumphs.

Billy Joe Patton of Morganton, N.C., and Dick Yost of Seattle finished off Gerald Micklem of England and John Morgan of Wales, 2 and 1.

Dale Morey of Indianapolis and Lt. Joe Conrad of San Antonio, Tex., scored a 3 and 2 triumph over England's Ian Caldwell and Ernest Millward.

And Jim Jackson of Glen Dale, Mo., teamed with 21-year-old Bruce Cudd of Portland, Ore. for the biggest victory margin of the day. They whipped Scotland's Maj. David Blair and Robin Cater 5 and 4.

Sportmen's Group Plans Hunting Area

The Lumberjack Sportsmen of Medford, a non-profit organization, has been incorporated at Salem, according to the United Press. Incorporators are A. C. Smith, president, Walter Craig, treasurer, and R. J. Hogue, secretary.

The group is made up of about 75 persons, all employees of the Medford corporation, and is for the purpose of promoting safe hunting practices, goodwill between hunters and owners of wild game lands in the state, and to lease and contract lands for hunting and fishing, Hogue said this week.

A sizable acreage along lower Rogue River already has been contracted and will be used mainly for bird hunting. The members now are doing some development work on the property, including small dams and ponds. For the present the group is interested mainly in bird hunting.

Students at Port Orford and Brookings will be inoculated in June if it can be arranged with parents; otherwise it will be postponed until September.
