## Columbia Probed for Bodies of Children

Hood River — (U.P.) — A tug probed the waters of the Columbia river without success yesterday in a hunt for the bodies of two three-year-old children believed to have drowned last week.

The search was renewed when Mel Lingren, sheriff's deputy, said he spotted what looked like a child's body floating face down in the Columbia just below the mouth of the Klickitat river.

The children were Terry Williams and her playmate, Walter Mark Greenfield, both of Klickitat. They were last seen playing on the Klickitat's bank.

## Veterans Affairs Loan Figures Told

Salem — (U.P.) — The Oregon Veterans Affairs Department loaned \$14,174,250 to 2094 veterans for purchase of homes and farms in the 12 months ended April 30. Director H. C. Saalfeld said today.

The loans are made to World War II and Korean veterans. In the 10 years since the loan program started, 14,439 veterans have borrowed \$71,813,439. They have paid back thirty-four million dollars in principal and interest.

## Stock Market Crash Repeat Unexpected

Portland—(U.P.)—Stuart F. Siloway, financial vice-president of Mutual Life Insurance of New York, said the United States is not due for a repeat stock market crash of 1929.

Siloway, who was in Portland yesterday, said the country's economy would have some setbacks, but he predicted an expanding economy, in general, for "a relatively long time."

"Given a reasonable favorable political atmosphere our economy will take care of itself for many years in the future."
