Mrs. Sales, competing in the doubles events, had low scores of 166 and 165 in her first two lines, then fired the 289, which tied a record held jointly by Irene Schram, Erie, Pa., (1948) and Phyllis Notaro, Angola, N.Y. (1951).

Saddler Seeks 100th Knockout

Sacramento — (U.P.) — Featherweight Champion Sandy Saddler will be out to score the 100th knockout of his career tonight when he tangles with Sacramento's Joey Lopes in a 10-round non-title bout.

The two were originally scheduled to meet here last month, but Saddler had to defer his appearance due to a virus infection. He became ill shortly after he stopped Kenny Davis in Butte, Mont.

Saddler, rated among the finest modern ring champions, is a top-heavy favorite to come away with a win over Lopes, whose last outing was a loss to Carmelo Costa in New York two months ago.

The champion was expected to come into the ring at about 131 pounds and Lopes at 133.

Three Legislators Report on Session To C of C Group

The three members of the Jackson county legislative delegation appeared at a breakfast meeting of the legislative committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce this morning, and discussed the recent session of the legislature.

The three are State Sen. Philip B. Lowry, and State Reps. E. H. Mann and E. A. Littrell.

It was pointed out that just because the legislature has adjourned, there is no reason to slack off interest in civic affairs, and Senator Lowry recommended that the chamber's committee be kept in being. He pointed out that there are a number of interim committees making studies of possible future legislation, and that such "grass roots" groups as this committee could have a real role in shaping new laws.

The more important interim groups include those named to study highways, taxes and election laws.

Senator Lowry said that public finance is going to continue to be one of the state's major continuing problems, and he cited what he termed a strong trend toward increasing state services, which in turn must be paid for.

There was a discussion of the growth of the population in the Willamette valley, and the effect this may have on legislative sessions in the future.

Bob Root, vice-chairman of the committee, presided at the session.

Knowland Confident Veto To Be Sustained

Washington — (U.P.) — Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland of California told President Eisenhower today that he was confident the Senate would sustain the chief executive's veto of a bill carrying an average pay increase of 8.8 percent for 500,000 postal employees.

Knowland reported to the President at the weekly White House meeting of GOP congressional leaders, then hurried to Capitol Hill for a meeting of the Senate Republican Policy committee on the pay bill. A vote was scheduled later today.

Steel Firm Plans Talked at Session

J. N. Laughlin, president of the Laughlin Alloy Steel company, discussed company plans for a steel mill operation in the Camp White area at the Chamber of Commerce roundtable yesterday. The company expects to start operations in July.

The operation will include five divisions, with only smelting operations of ore reduction located elsewhere. Included in plans for Camp White departments are mining and milling, ore reduction, electric furnace steel manufacturing, machine shop and fabricating and a pipe and tube mill.

The company will eventually employ about 250 men, and stock will not be sold on the open market, Laughlin said.
