Jorgensen's dairy, Medford, had a 2645 tabulation for team honors. Billie Gardner, Grants Pass, won all-events with 1797 and Pat Gardner, Medford, had high game with 236.

Panaslipper from Ireland was second and favored Acropolis finished third in the mile and one half classic, which is used to determine prizes in the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes.

An estimated 400,000 persons, including Queen Elizabeth, the Duke of Edinburgh, the Queen Mother and Princess Margaret, witnessed the event.

Phil Drake was 100 to 8 in the betting. Panaslipper was a 100 to 1 shot, while Acropolis, owned by Alice Lady Derby, was the 11 to 4 choice of the huge crowd.

With a club which is felt should be a strong contender in the Southern Oregon Baseball League this year and with an ambitious schedule which brings some potent semi-pro clubs to the fairgrounds, the Medford Cheney Studs are hopeful of fine support from fans this season.

Studs officials point out that if the local club is well-backed by fans, if attendance at games is good, more and stronger teams can be brought in here next year. Future caliber of the Studs and their competition depends much on gate receipts since Cheney Forest Products is "going it alone" in fielding the team. Business Manager Bill Askwith has pointed out that the Studs are soliciting no aid from other business firms.

CHENEY OBLIGATION

The Cheney club, itself, however, has an obligation. That is to display good, hustling, hard-hitting colorful baseball of the kind which will make fans want to come back. Player Manager Clarence Melby and Bill Askwith feel that Studs' hitting power, pitching and infield play will be improved over last year. There should be an upsurge in baseball interest here if the recruiting efforts prove out.

Klamath Council Eyes Purchase Of Gem Stadium

Klamath Falls—(U.P.)—The Klamath Falls city council has been asked by Bob Bonney, city park and recreation director, to take immediate action on a proposal to purchase Gem stadium situated just outside the city limits.

The stadium was used originally as a baseball field and later converted to a speedway. The recreation department wants the city to take over the field as a recreational facility. Provided a plan can be worked out with stadium bond holders, the city will use the stadium for its 50 softball teams and the Oregon state softball championships, slated for August of this year.

Purchase of the stadium would depend on a vote of the people at the next general election.

Mims Takes On Charley Green

St. Louis, Mo.—(U.P.)—Holly Mims, whose busy fists have earned him the number four spot among the middleweights, and Charley Green, a knockout artist from California, will meet at the Arena tonight in a nationally televised 10-round match.

Green has won 42 and lost 12 of his 54 fights, knocking out 27 while compiling the record. He won both his 1955 appearances, taking a unanimous decision over Don Grant and stopping Zeke Robinson in the second round.

Mims, whose record is not quite as spectacular, probably has an edge in the class of opponents faced. He has 5 draws, 13 losses and has knocked out nine.

Junior Baseball Plans Outlined

Lee Ragsdale, Medford school physical education supervisor, last night was reelected president of the Southern Oregon Junior Baseball league at a meeting here last night.

June 20 was set tentatively as starting date for league play in three divisions, pee wee, intermediate and cub.

Ragsdale said that Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland will field cub teams and play each other three times.

Grants Pass will have its own pee wee circuit and will not play intermediate ball. The intermediate circuit will be made up of Central Point, Medford, Lone Pine and Ashland. Members of the pee wee circuit in this area will be Lone Pine, Central Point, Ashland Jacksonville and two Medford teams.

Vancouver Pinball Bill Passes Reading

Vancouver, Wash.—(U.P.)—A move to license pinball machines in Vancouver for parks and recreation purposes passed a first reading at the city council meeting here last night. Approval at another hearing June 7 would restore the devices to taverns and bars in the city across the river from Portland.

Officials believed the pinball license would create between \$22,000 and \$30,000 per year at a \$40 per month fee for each machine.

Two petitions bearing signatures of some 800 persons opposed to pinballs were submitted to the council last night but the ordinance was approved by a 6 to 1 vote.

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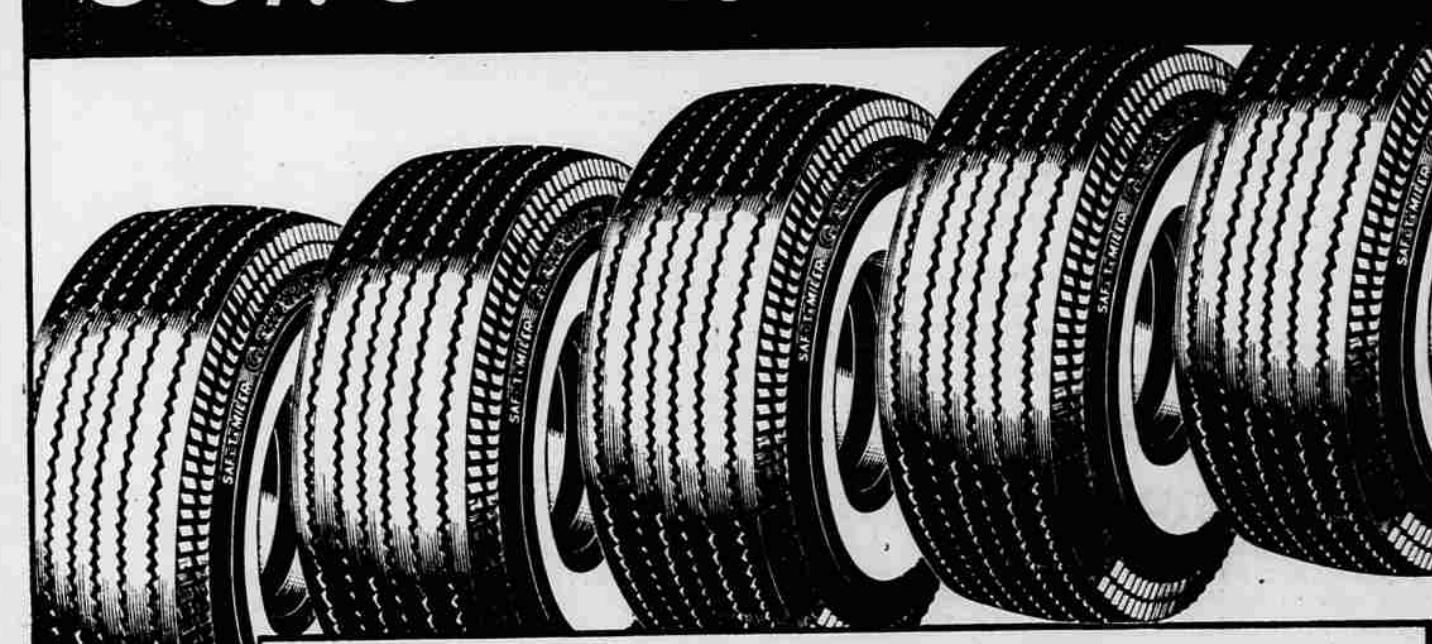
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
