

Improving of Meals At State Institutions Scheduled for Study

Salem—(U.P.)—The feeding program in state institutions will be studied to the objective of standardizing and improving meals, the State Board of Control has decided.

By elimination of waste and by coordinating the food program at the various state institutions the state can save \$400,000, Al Richardson, food manager at the state penitentiary, estimated.

Will Cut Estimate

But Miss Elsie Maxwell, food consultant for the Board of Control, pointed out that additional overhead could cut the estimate.

The question of whether an adequate diet was being provided to patients of Oregon State hospital arose when Leo Margosian of the State Department of Finance and Administration said savings could be expected in all institutions except the state hospital.

Gov. Paul L. Patterson wanted to know if increased cost of feeding at the state hospital was due to "underfeeding" at the

present time.

Miss Maxwell, who has spent half a year supervising installation of equipment at the hospital's new kitchen, said many of those who are now bedfast could get on their feet if a better diet was provided.

They eventually will need centralized warehousing to provide savings by mass purchases, Bill Ireland, secretary of the board of control, said. Richardson said the problem is comparatively simple in Oregon because nearly all the institutions are within an 18 mile radius of Salem.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said he thought the proposed program was sound and would save the state money.

Standards based on a ration system developed by the federal government and by other states would assure greater savings than are possible under the present system, Miss Maxwell said.

Agriculture Dept. Men To Meet Today To Discuss Work

Medford is site for one of the four educational meetings which the Oregon department of agriculture is holding for field personnel. The meeting here will be tonight at the Jackson hotel.

This will mark the first meeting of the new director of agriculture, J.F. Short, with department field workers in the southern Oregon area.

The program will deal with work of the department, and is designed to improve services.

Division chiefs from Salem who have fieldmen working in this area will be present to summarize new department laws. These leaders are M. E. Knickerbocker, animal division; O. K. Beals, foods and dairies division, and Frank McKennon, plant division.

Fieldmen working in various capacities will give reports covering one week's work. These reports will show nature of the work and territory covered, and problems encountered.

Fieldmen stationed in Medford, Grants Pass, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Roseburg, Coos Bay, and Cottage Grove will attend. Besides those working regularly in this area, personnel from Salem and Corvallis whose work happens to put them in southern Oregon this week will be present.

Mistrial Hearing Set In Lebanon Assault

Albany—(U.P.)—District Judge Wendell Tompkins has set June 6 as the date for a hearing on Linn County District Attorney Courtney Johns' motion for a mistrial in the case of Dale Hetland.

Hetland last week was found innocent of assault and battery charges, but Johns said one of the six jurors had once been convicted of grand larceny. He said this invalidated the trial.

The charges against Hetland grew out of an attack several months ago on the husband of a Lebanon woman who was conducting an unofficial investigation of alleged misuse of welfare funds.

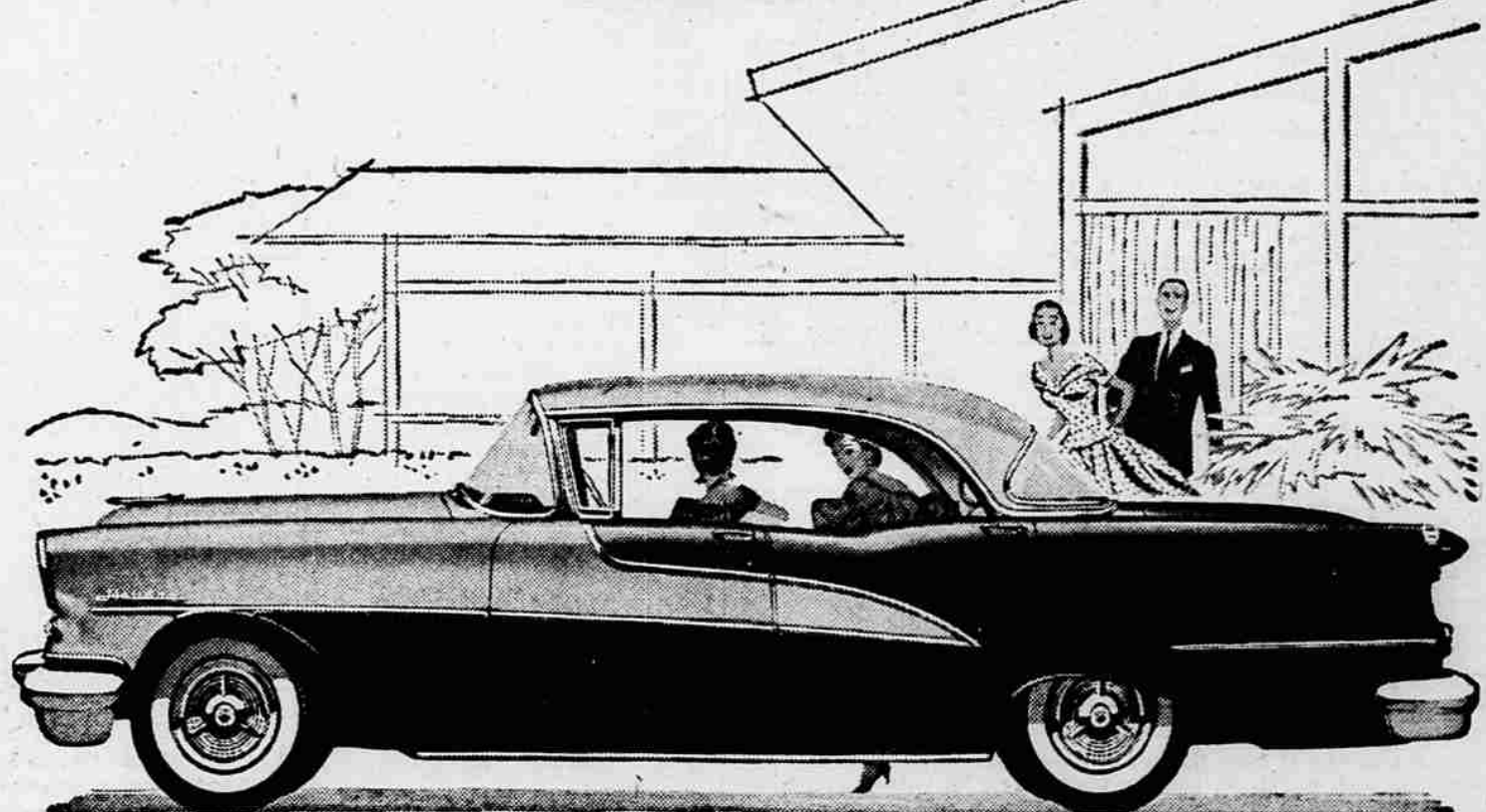
