High Lakes To Be Open To Anglers

Willow lake and Lake o' Woods are among trout fishing spots which will open to anglers this Saturday. Willow lake is the Medford city water department reservoir near Butte Falls. It is opening to anglers for the first time and a store and boat dock will be operating. Road to Lake o' Woods from Ashland by way of Dead Indian is open. The route from Fish Lake is closed but the road from Klamath Falls is open, the resort management announced.

Portland—(U.P.)—Thousands of Oregonians were expected to head for high lakes as they open to fishing Saturday but the State Game Commission warned that they check on road conditions to make certain which lakes are accessible.

More than 1000 new fishing holes will be available. The opening includes such popular spots as Crane Prairie reservoir and Davis, North and South Twin, and Lava lakes.

May Be Ice Bound
Because of the late spring, many high lakes still will be icebound for several weeks to come and many trails and roads also will be blocked with snow. East and Paulina lakes are heavily coated with ice and the camp grounds are covered with snow.

Need for Balance in Oregon's Tax Program Expressed by Sen. Lowry in Report to Club

Need for a balance between income and sales taxes to help solve Oregon's taxation and financial problems was expressed by State Sen. Phil Lowry in a talk yesterday to Medford Kiwanians at Rogue Valley Country club.

Lowry, speaking at the service club's luncheon meeting, outlined the work and accomplishments of the 1955 session of the state legislature.

Discusses Measures Taken

Discussing tax measures taken and the failure of the sales tax bill to pass the Senate, the senator declared that steps should be taken toward balance in the Oregon tax system. The systems in Oregon and Washington are badly out of balance, he said. Lowry mentioned to Kiwanians that all of them should be aware of the impact of taxes on business. He brought out that opportunities can be taxed away or limited.

Defeat of the sales tax proposal was the result of a combination of factors, Lowry reported. He stated that the Senate got the bill from the House of Representatives late in the session, that it disagreed drastically with the House measure, that took the "sugar coating" out, and that politics had entered in. "We can't afford any longer to make the sales tax a political football," Lowry asserted. He indicated that he favored the house version of the measure.

Describes Income Change

In income tax measures passed, Lowry reported, personal exemptions were reduced from \$600 to \$500 and a 45 per cent surtax was imposed. The legislation was designed to raise \$42,000,000. The utility tax exemption was taken out along with the "sky-scraper" ualcslew cO ihh

scrapers" clause which provided exemptions for corporations drawing most of their income from rentals.

A letter to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission to increase its prices and a cigarette tax were other means taken to provide that the cigarette measure will be referred to the people. **Cites Responsibility**

The senator spoke of the legislature's responsibility to see that the state's \$600,000,000 budget annually is well spent. He pointed out that the 1955 legislature appropriated \$217,000,000 out of the general fund as compared to \$42,000,000 in 1945.

Vote by the people for such

items as basic school support and public welfare has contributed to the 500 per cent increase in appropriations, Lowry said. "People are demanding more and more that the legislature solve problems they formerly solved themselves," the senator declared.

People have demanded that services be first class, according to Lowry, but the price for the individual citizen is high. He cited Oregon, at \$78.83 per person, as fourth highest in per capita debt on the state level. He pointed to a decline in normal income from 1952 and said the economy of the state is not so stable as "we would like to have it be."

Grain and Seed Use Seen in Hay Shortage

Hay shortages in Oregon and neighboring states, coupled with below average yield prospects this year, may prompt harvesting of more grain and seed crops as hay, believe Oregon State college extension specialists.

A scant 150,000 tons of hay on Oregon farms May 1, roughly half as much as a year earlier and only enough for two or three weeks normal feeding, was reported by the USDA crop reporting service.

Water shortages in some areas of the state have dropped yield prospects for "tame" hay 8 per cent below last year, and the outlook for "wild" hay is even darker although somewhat improved by April rains and snow. Wild hay meadows normally produce about one-fifth of Oregon's tonnage.

Pastures may prove good bets for many Oregon farmers unable to make seedings of other crops planned earlier, OSC economists advise. Recent build-ups in feed grain and livestock, they say, may leave Oregon short on hay and pasture for some time.

Aug. 18, James M. Torson, executive director of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults, the Easter Seal agency, has announced.

The camp, located on North lake of Ten Mile lake near Reedsport, will accommodate boys and girls from 6 to 18 years of age. Sessions will be for 10-day periods as follows:

July 6 to 16, 6 to 9 years; July 18 to 27, 8 to 11 years; July 29 to August 7, 12 to 17 years, and August 9 to 18, 18 years and older.

Open to All

Torson said the camp is open to all children, regardless of their handicap. Attendants can be provided for those whose handicap is so severe that they need assistance at all times. Fee for the 10-day session is \$25 and an additional \$20 for an attendant, if needed.

Torson said there are some camps available through service and fraternal organizations for needy youngsters.

Applications should be sent to Torson at the Portland headquarters of the Easter Seal agency, 1135 S. W. Yamhill street, Portland. The camp can be reached by bus.

The sessions will include fishing, craft work, hiking, camp fires and other group activities. Torson reported. An occupational therapist will be included on the camp staff, along with other trained personnel.

Steel Production To Continue High

New York—(U.P.)—The steel industry's operating rate may now be hitting its peak for 1955 but production will continue high, according to Benjamin F. Fairless, retired chairman of U. S. Steel Corp.

Fairless told newsmen prior to the opening of the American Iron & Steel Institute meeting Wednesday that "there isn't anything that can stop the year from being a good one."

The steel executive, still active in U. S. Steel affairs despite his recent retirement as chairman, also expressed optimism on the steel industry's prospects. He held to a previous prediction that 108,000,000 ingot tons would be produced in 1955, second highest total on record.
