Erautt, Rapp Shine As Pads Crush Angels

The win - happy San Diego Padres volleyed and thundered for a 16-1 triumph over Los Angeles last night. It was their 14th straight victory and 24th in 25 games.

Eddie Erautt muted Angel bats with a nifty four - hitter while Earl Rapp, San Diego's biggest cannoner, helped his team to a 15-0 lead in the first four innings with two homers good for seven runs.

Rapp leads the league with 15 home runs and 67 runs batted in. Buddy Peterson also had a great night at the plate, cracking three doubles and two singles for three RBIs.

Erautt didn't allow a man to reach base until the sixth and blanked the Angels until the ninth when they scored an unearned run. The 30-year-old righthander fanned five and walked only one in registering his fifth straight win for a 6-1 mark.

Other Games
In other games, Walt Judnich made the Portland Beavers rue the day they waived him to San Francisco when he socked a 10th inning homer to give the Seals a 6-5 win over the Bevs; Oakland clubbed out a 9-2 victory over Sacramento.

The Hollywood at Seattle game was rained out. A double-header is scheduled for tonight. Judnich, sold to the Seals several weeks ago for the usual \$1 waiver price, doubled in San Francisco's first two runs in the first inning besides his game winning homer in the top of the 10th.

The game was tied twice and neither starting pitcher, Jim Melton of the Seals and Bob Hall of the Beavers, was around

at the finish. Bill Bradford came in the seventh to post his second win after on defeat. Lee Anthony, fourth Beaver pitcher, suffered the loss, his first after two wins.

Ed Mickelson led the Portland hitter with a double and two singles to drive in four of his team's five runs.

Two newcomers to the Studs likely will get the pitching summons this week end, Warren Noyes, ex-pro from Seattle, is Manager Clarence Melby's likely choice for Saturday night. Marv Scherpf is probable Sunday starter. Ray Kelley and Melby will be available for relief if needed.

Saturday night catcher will be Frank Roelandt. Howard Morris or Jim McAbee may get the bid Sunday although Roelandt still may be on hand.

Probable starting Cheney infield for both games has Jack Cooney at first base, Ritchie Price at second and Ed McCullough at third with Melby at shortstop. McCullough has been a pitcher and outfielder for Medford high this season but held down third base at Bend last week end.

Studs' outfielders will be picked from among Bill McLean, John Niles, Harvey Tonn and Kay Kelley on Saturday and from among McLean, Niles, Larry Bigham and Noyes on Sunday.

What a Roseburg source terms "a makeshift line-up composed of some local and some outside ball players," is expected to take to the field here for the Chiefs.

The infield may be picked from Bill Harper, George Sanders, Les Winders, Harvey Witten, John Linde and Fred Hargis. The first three are ex-Chiefs. Winder is slated to assume manager of the Roseburg Eagles of the Evergreen league. Witten is a former College of Idaho player now living in Sutherlin. Linde is an ex-pro who will have coach status with the Chiefs. Hargis is from Roseburg high.

Don Luby, son of the Salem Senator manager, Hugh Luby, may be the Roseburg catcher. He is a student at South Salem high school.

Don White, ex-Oregon State college and ex-Coos Bay-North Bend, and Jerry Droscher, from Roseburg high, may be the pitchers. White has been hired to coach baseball at Roseburg high next year.

"Ban" on Southern Seas Branded Another Joke Under Heading of Hypocrisy of Amateur Athletics

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The decision of the Pacific Coast Conference to "ban" the Southern Seas as a recruiting agency for University of California must come under the heading of another joke in the general hypocrisy of amateur athletics.

I'm not blaming the PCC—because it was just pointing the finger at an organization that had become "too obvious" in its recruiting policies.

But there are recruiting agencies for practically every major football school in the country — and that includes all the academies of higher learning in the PCC.

There is a "Buck of the Month" club for nearly every school in the conference — and this club, in most cases, uses its money to help recruit top prep prospects.

Common Knowledge
It is common knowledge that star high school players can take their choice of a dozen or so offers when it comes to going to college — and the school with the highest bid very often is the one with the most successful team.

Before the advent of college as a big-time basis, it was very seldom that the gridiron roster included the names of boys from any place except the home state — and most of these were within a radius of a few miles of the campus.

Nowadays, players from Pennsylvania, Ohio and New York dot the list of performers in this conference; and stars from California, Oregon and Washington show up in the Big Ten.

Ducks Start Coast Series With Troy

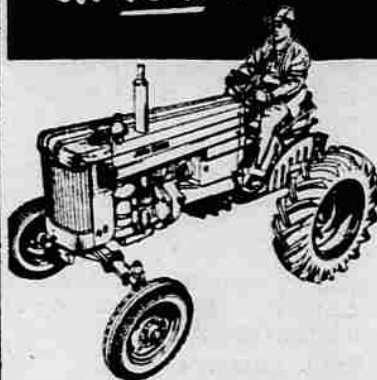
Los Angeles — (U.P.) — University of Oregon's ace sophomore righthander, Terry Maddox, of Medford, was to have taken the mound today against University of Southern California's Vic Lapiner in the first game of a two-out-of-three elimination series in the NCAA District Eight championships.

The winner of the series will face the winner of the small college elimination round beginning in Fresno today between Fresno State, Willamette, Pepperdine and San Jose State for the right to go to the NCAA College World Series June 10-15 in Omaha, Neb.

The Oregon-Pacific series, which is also for the Pacific Coast Conference title, was expected to see some heavy hitting. Rightfielder Norm Forbes is hitting at a .557 clip and George Shaw, ace quarterback and centerfielder, at .354 for the Webfeet.

The Trojans have a team average of 3.07 with outfielder Gerry Mason and Tony Santino batting .457 and .438 respectively. Pitcher Maddox has a 6-0 record this year, while Lapiner, the workhorse of the Trojan staff, won five and lost none in CIBA play.

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
