Portland—(U.P.)—The Pacific States Canning Pear Marketing association was formed here yesterday by pear growers from Oregon, Washington and California.

Jack Z. Anderson, San Francisco, president of the California Canning Pear association, said the new group is subject to ratification by respective member associations.

The association would represent more than 1950 growers producing 250,000 tons of canning pears annually.

28 Rail Crossing Mishaps in April

Salem — (U.P.) — Twenty-eight railway grade crossing accidents were reported in Oregon for April, resulting in one person being killed and 11 injured, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said today.

Twenty grade crossing accidents took one life and injured nine persons in April, 1954.

Most train-car accidents take place in urban areas where railway and vehicular traffic is the heavier. Chief causes are disregard of automatic warning signals and misjudging the speed and distance of approaching trains.
