**Tiny Padlock Described
As Safety Measure for
Tools and Appliances**

Milwaukee—(U.P.)—A thumb-nail-sized padlock can be used as a safety measure for youngsters by "locking out" the electrical plugs of lamps, power tools and appliances when not in use.

The tiny laminated steel padlock contains a shackle, or "hook," only one-eighth of an inch thick, small enough to fit virtually every electrical plug. When the padlock is snapped shut through the hole in either prong of the plug, it becomes impossible for children to insert the plug into an outlet.

Called the "Cub," the padlock weighs less than an ounce and stands slightly more than an inch high. It can also be used for locking zippers, brief cases, golf bags and mail boxes.

Keeping a dark summer cotton dress free from lint is easier if it's washed alone or with other dark, colorfast items.
