ONE CAN'T IMPUGN WITH IMPUNITY

Tonsillectomy in the overwhelming majority of instances is followed by marked improvement in the health of the patient. In fact, it has been my experience, says Paul Herzog, M.D., in a letter to his home town paper, that in the large majority of children, recovery is prompt, thorough, and gains in weight and vigor follow . . . The overall death rate from tonsillectomies is extremely low, and not at all as high as Dr. Brady would have the public believe. Tonsillectomy is so rarely fatal, Dr. Herzog would have the public believe, that to condemn the operation, as I do, when the benefits accrued are so great and the hazards so minimal is "impugning the medical profession."

Dr. Herzog describes tonsillotomy, which I recommend instead of the major operation for enlarged tonsils in children, as "removal of part of the tonsils," and dismisses it as "obsolete." He opines that an article of mine condemning tonsillectomies "reveals abysmal ignorance."

If you can still hear me, folks, I send this message from away down here in the abyss: Week by week, as the reports of fatalities from the unnecessary major operation come in, I become more and more prejudiced against it.

The fact such scattered fatalities do occur, unnecessarily, as I believe, far outweighs the improvement in health and the gains in weight and vigor which are commonly ascribed to the

major operation. Children usually gain steadily in weight and vigor as they grow, and this gain usually continues after the brief retardation of growth occasioned by illness. However, there can be no doubt that the benefits accrued, if the child survives the operation, are equal to any benefits accrued from tonsillotomy.

I have yet to hear of a fatality from tonsillotomy. Defenders of the major operation, tonsillectomy, ignore two counts in my indictment of tonsillectomy, namely, (1) the most authoritative statistics on record in regard to the effect of tonsillotomy upon the frequency of alleged "colds" in school children, and (2) reports on record showing that in most instances tonsillectomy leaves portions of tonsil in the throat and in some instances portions of throat muscle are removed along with the portions of tonsil included in the dissection.

Since I have aired these charges in the public prints the ever-ready operators have not sounded off so loudly or so bravely about the importance of "getting every bit of tonsil"—as they do when they operate. Dr. Herzog is modest about this. When he maintains that tonsillotomy, removal of part of the tonsil, is inadequate, regardless of the circumstances, he implies that lymphoid (tonsil) tissue in itself is malignant or in some vague way harmful to the child's health.

I'm afraid a good many doctors harbor some such notion and I impugn them for it. Incidentally, a good many doctors tell me privately they agree with me. They hesitate to speak out at present because their colleagues are likely to charge that they "impugn the profession." I don't blame 'em. If I were in practice today I'd keep my mouth shut.

Research Said Needed To Cut Dental Bill

Chicago—(U.P.)—More dollars for research would be the most effective means of reducing the nation's enormous yearly bill for dental care, according to the president of the American Dental Association.

Dr. Daniel F. Lynch, Washington, D. C., set the bill at over \$1,400,000,000, including \$100,000,000 spent by the government on the teeth of veterans, members of the armed forces and others.

"The government allocates only \$2,000,000 to support dental research which might prevent these dental ills," Lynch said, "termining this a 'hardly realistic approach' to the problem."

He indicated that the same approach prevails elsewhere and called for increased backing for dental research.

"No genuine profession could exist without a relentless search for new facts, and no genuine health profession could long manage to exist without a foundation of research, if there is to be real progress in the service rendered to the public," he concluded.

Oakland, Calif.—(U.P.)—Members of the California state branch of the National Association of Dental Supervisors Saturday concluded a two day annual convention by electing Ed. O. Jefferson, Oakland, as president for the coming year.
