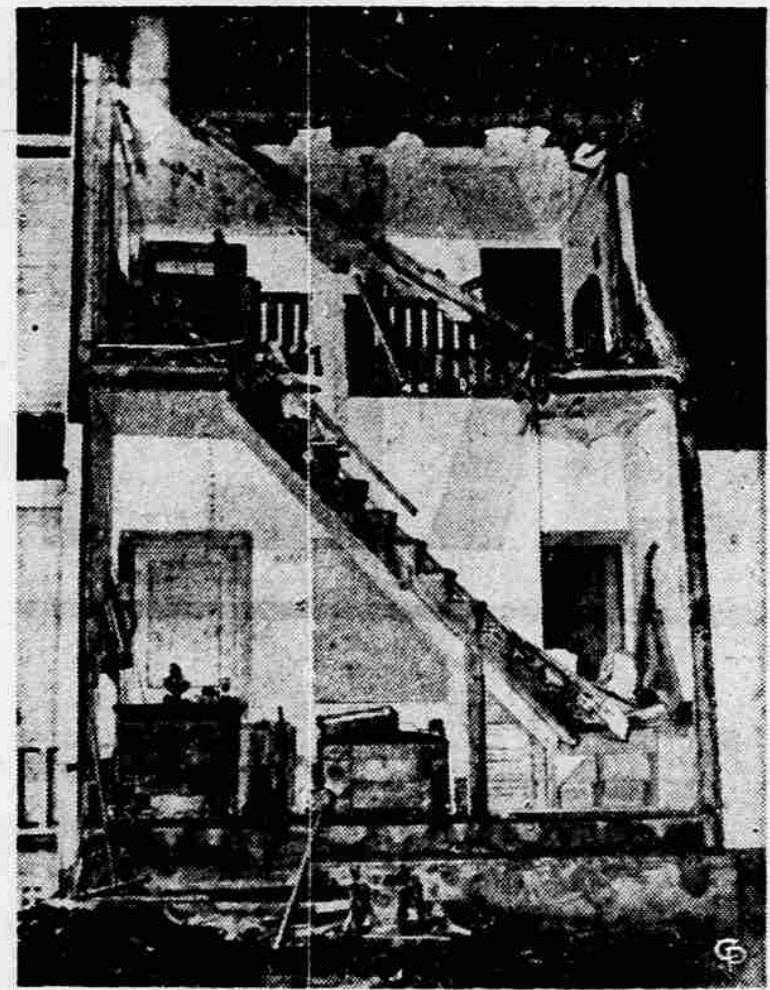

Justices Honor Judge Stephens

Washington — (U.P.) — More than 600 persons attended funeral services today for Harold Montelle Stephens, 69, who died Saturday of cancer after serving as chief judge of the U. S. Court of Appeals here for nearly 20 years.

His colleagues for various courts, including Chief Justice Earl Warren, paid their last respects at a special court room services.

Later, Bishop Duane Hunt of Salt Lake City offered up a requiem low mass at St. Thomas Apostle Catholic church. An estimated 600 government officials, congressmen, senators and fellow jurists attended.

Stephens' body will be escorted by a nephew, John Trenam, back to Salt Lake City today and will arrive there Thursday morning.

Beside his wife, Virginia, Stephens leaves a brother, E. W. Stephens, Burlingame, Calif.

Indian Bureau Workers Lose Jobs

Portland — (U.P.) — The Department of Interior announced here today that seven employees of the Bureau of Indian Affairs office in Portland would be discharged as a result of transfer of the bureau's health service to the department of public health.

Dr. Ruth Dunham, area medical director, said, however, that those discharged by the bureau would have top priority for the same jobs with the public health service.

Superintendents of eight Indian reservations in Oregon, Washington and Idaho will meet here Thursday to become acquainted with the new organization.

Klamath River Compact Approved

Washington — (U.P.) — The House Interior Committee today approved a bill to permit California and Oregon to negotiate a compact for the equitable distribution of the waters of the Klamath river.

The measure also would permit the two states to negotiate a contract about the Lost river which, like the Klamath river, runs through Oregon and California and which is connected to the Klamath river by a canal.

First Woman To Get Concordia Diploma

Portland — (U.P.) — Louise Rodgers of Corvallis will become the first woman in the 50-year history of Concordia College here to receive a diploma when graduation exercises are held next Friday.

Ten of her classmates and 13 high school seniors will also receive diplomas from the Rev. Thomas Coates, president of the college.

La Grande — (U.P.) — Fred Schneider has assumed duties as secretary manager of the Chamber of Commerce of La Grande and Union county.

Portland — (U.P.) — Henry L. Holgate, 88, retired chief counsel for the U. S. Reclamation Service died Monday.

Geese Ride Herd On Nursery Weeds

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Forestry Department, which has used helicopters to sow tree seed, bloodhounds to track incendiaries and radio-active beetles to combat the bark beetle epidemic, has turned to geese to ride herd on weeds at the Oregon forest nursery.

Vern McDaniel, nursery supervisor, said the geese will do the job and save the state money—provided the fowl will play fair and eat the weeds and not the forestry seeds.

McDaniel said one of the biggest headaches in managing a forest nursery is the problem of keeping the birds from eating the tree seeds after they are planted in the nursery. To grow some 9,000,000 seedlings each year for the farmers and tree people, each of the seeds obviously must grow into a little tree.

And to scare away the countless thousands of birds who'd like to keep those seedlings from growing into little trees, McDaniel has some of the highest paid "birdwatchers" in the northwest keeping watch.

But the geese like the weeds instead of the seeds. And so they are coming to Oregon's timberlands.
