Moran Accused Of Lying During Johnson Hearing

Philadelphia —(U.P.)— Matchmaker Pete Moran returned for further questioning by the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission today after the testimony of a blonde surprise witness led Commissioner Al Klein to accuse Moran of lying under oath.

Moran was under orders to bring his income tax statements over the past five years to the commission investigation of the Harold Johnson-Julio Mederos bout, which Johnson lost here May 6 after collapsing at the end of the second round. A commission doctor said Johnson was drugged.

Moran's return to the witness chair came on the heels of testimony by Mrs. Goldie Perri Wednesday that the name of her husband, Peter, on a contract listing him as co-manager man in the case, was located in a hospital by police and denied in an affidavit that he ever entered into any managerial or other agreement with Johnson and his manager of record, Tommy Loughrey. Johnson and Loughrey denied knowing Perri, whose purported signature appeared alongside theirs on a contract dated Sept. 24, 1948.

"If my name appears on any contract, the signature thereto is a forgery," Perri said in the affidavit.

Klein made his accusation against Moran after Mrs. Perri told the three-man commission Moran suggested to her at a meeting last Thursday night that Perri should state he signed the Johnson contract, if he were called to testify.

Snider's Thundering Bat Main Factor In 11-8 Dodger Victory Over Braves

Duke Snider's thunderous bat was wiping out the memory of his disappointing 1934 finish today while his Brooklyn Dodger teammates were well on their way to wiping out the all-time club record of 221 homers in one season.

Snider, who lost the National League batting title to Willie Mays on the final day of last season, drove in six runs with three homers and a double Wednesday night as the Dodgers walloped the Milwaukee Braves, 11-8, with a six-homer outburst.

The 29-year-old slugger thus took over the major league lead with 15 home runs and 48 runs batted in, in addition to raising his season's average to .319. The six home runs gave the Dodgers a total of 67 in 44 games—a pace that would give them a season's total of 321. The 1947 New York Giants set the all-time record of 231.

Curious Surprise

The wild slugfest was a curious surprise for the 18,360 fans who expected a third pitching duel between Milwaukee's Gene Conley and Brooklyn's Carl Erskine. Conley and Erskine had engaged in two 12-inning duels previously this season in which a total of five runs were scored. When the smoke cleared there had been a total of 25 hits, including five doubles, two triples and six homers for 52 total bases.

Jackie Robinson, who hit one of the homers off Conley, revealed it was none other than pitcher Don Newcombe who set the stage for the slugfest.

"Don watched Conley warm up before the game and noticed he wasn't masking his curve ball," Robinson explained. "He was right. And, as a result, we knew every pitch he was throwing."

Erskine received credit for his seventh victory of the season but was routed when the Braves scored five runs in the seventh inning and needed Jim Hughes' shutout relief pitching to preserve the verdict. On top of

The San Diego Padres resumed their winning ways in the Pacific Coast League last night but it took 11 innings and a crucial Oakland error to do it.

Beaten in four of their last five games after winning 25 of 26, the league-leading Padres edged out the Oaks, 1-0, with an unearned run in the 11th inning set up by shortstop Russ Rose's error.

With no one out and men on first and second, Earl Rapp grounded to third baseman Billy Conso who threw to Rose at second. Rose took the throw but failed to touch second and the bases were loaded.

On the next play, Rose took Eddie Kazak's grounder and nailed Buddy Peterson at the plate for one out. But the next

man, Julio Becquer, flied to right and Milt Smith easily scored with the winning run.

The run wrecked brilliant pitching performance by Chris Van Cuyk (0-1) who gave up only five hits and fanned 10 in going the route. San Diego's Eddie Erault (8-2) gave up 10 hits but was tough in the clutch.

Advance Guard Begins U. S. Open Qualifying

New York —(U.P.)— The "advance guard" of a field of more than 1,500 golfers started competition in Los Angeles today for the 145 qualifying places in the U.S. Open championships.

The championships are scheduled for the Olympic Country Club, San Francisco, June 16 through June 18. A total of 907 professionals and 605 amateurs—1,512 golfers in all—are in the qualifying rounds in 25 sections.

The Los Angeles section will be completed on Thursday and another round is scheduled for San Francisco on June 6 and 7. The 23 other rounds will be played throughout the country on June 6.

The 145 qualifiers will join 17 exempt players in the open play.

Palm Beach Golf Tourney Starts

Middlecoff, a former Round Robin winner, indicated he was on a hot streak by picking up a total of \$1,200 in preliminary contests Wednesday.

It was Cam's sixth loss in 38 professional fights. Both weighed in at 129 pounds.
