Idaho Power Forced To Purchase Kilowatts

Boise — (U.P.) — The Idaho Power Company said today it has been forced to purchase 10,000 kilowatts of steam-produced power from Utah Power and Light to alleviate a shortage to southern Idaho and eastern Oregon customers.

Idaho Power President T. E. Roach said the supplemental purchase was made necessary by delays in authorization for his company's projects on the Snake river below Weiser.

The company has proposed that it be allowed to construct three low dams in the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake, but federal power proponents have been fighting for a single high dam.

Fish Believed Color Blind

Ann Arbor, Mich. — (U.P.) — Can a fish really see all those gaudy colors on hook lures? Fisheries scientists have been trying to answer this question conclusively for ages, said Karl F. Lagler, chairman of the University of Michigan's department of fisheries.

The best answer so far is that "no fish is known not to have color vision."

On the other hand, there is no final proof that a fish does see color as the fisherman sees it, he said.

Some fish, such as the large-mouth bass and certain trout, definitely have shown that they are able to discriminate between colors. It is probable that various fishes exhibit different degrees of color sensitivity, he said.

Judging from appearances to man when viewed under water, he continued, it seems that surface lures like dry flies and floating plugs offer no color, but are viewed only in silhouette.

Some support to claims that fish do perceive colors in the fact that many fresh water species are so brilliantly hued. This is especially so during the breeding season, Lagler said, and may be of use in recognition of mates.

"Males are usually brighter or more intensely colored than females," he pointed out.

Further support for those who say fish have color vision is the fact that many fish are able to adapt themselves to differently colored backgrounds.

"An outstanding example of this chameleon quality in fish is the flounder, which can closely match a checkerboard or a piece of plaid when placed on it," Lagler explained.

Suspect 'Blacked Out' On Night of Murder
San Rafael, Calif. — (U.P.) — Rodney Sheran today still maintained he "blacked out" last Wednesday night when he allegedly murdered his wife, Esme, on Mt. Tamalpais.

Marin County Sheriff David Menary took the accused 35-year-old San Rafael contractor to the murder scene yesterday but said Sheran showed no emotion and refused to change his story.

Sheran was captured in eastern Oregon last Saturday night during a west coast manhunt.

Western Aleutian Earthquake Recorded

Pasadena, Calif. — (U.P.) — Seismographs at the California Institute of Technology have recorded an earthquake of major proportions in the Western Aleutian Islands.

Dr. Charles F. Richter, head of the seismology laboratory, said the quake occurred at 4:27 p.m. (PST) yesterday about 3500 miles from here.

"It appears to be in the Western Aleutian Islands, and probably caused no destruction," he said.
