

Administration Opens Campaign for Support Of Foreign Policies

Washington — (U.P.) — The Eisenhower administration Saturday opened a new campaign for bipartisan support of U. S. foreign policy in preparation for the forthcoming Big Four conference.

President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles planned to work out final details of the campaign at a conference at the White House. Later in the day Dulles flew to Columbia, S.C. for a week end visit with Rep. James P. Richards, the South Carolina Democrat who heads the House Foreign Affairs committee. Richards lives about 50 miles from Columbia.

On Monday, Dulles will deliver a commencement address at the University of South Carolina. Advance word was that he planned to stress again the need for Republican - Democratic cooperation on foreign policy at this stage of world affairs.

The new emphasis on coordinating foreign policy planning with the Democrats may have been spurred by Vice - President Richard M. Nixon's comments in Chicago Thursday on the approaching Big Four conference with Russia.

Contrary to previous administration policy, Nixon said the top level parley may be the world's last chance to "settle differences peacefully and avoid a catastrophic war."

Democratic Protest Feared
Some high administration officials feared Nixon's comment might touch off a Democratic storm of protest that administration policies were uncoordinated. Mr. Eisenhower and Dulles previously had emphasized that the Big Four meeting should be

thought of in less sensational terms — as only a start toward future negotiations by diplomats.

The President and Dulles also were expected to go over prospects of getting more Americans out of Red China's jails now that four fliers have been freed. And possibly they will discuss the forthcoming appearance of the President at the 10th anniversary ceremonies of the United Nations on June 20th at San Francisco. The President will deliver a major foreign policy address on that occasion.

Attorney for Finns Planning to Carry Fight to President

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — An 87-year-old attorney for the Finns, now in the 47th day of a hunger strike at Springfield, Mo., will carry his fight to have them freed from prison to Washington.

Attorney Joseph Scott, an elder statesman of the Republican party in California, disclosed Friday he would seek executive clemency for the brothers although President Eisenhower said they "set themselves above the law."

Get One-Year Terms
The brothers, George and Charles, were ordered to serve one-year terms in the medical center for federal prisoners at Springfield for slapping handcuffs on a U. S. attorney while in a dispute with the government over ownership on a surplus C46A airplane.

Mrs. Sarah Ferguson, of Long Beach, Calif., a cousin of the president, made public his letter in answer to her plea that leniency be shown the Finns. The President wrote that the Finns set themselves above the law and sought to gain their ends by arresting and handcuffing the U. S. attorney.

Scott, who conferred with the twins Thursday, said he was more than ever determined to carry through the program to "extricate these unfortunate veterans from the horrible situation in which they are now placed."

Snead Takes Golf Lead

Great Neck, N.Y. — (U.P.) — Slammin' Sammy Snead matched the course record with a 33-33—66 Saturday to pick up a startling 20 points and take a three-point lead over British open champion Peter Thomson in defense of his Palm Beach Round-Robin golf championship at Deepdale Golf club.

Thirteen points behind the leading Thomson when the semi-final round began, Snead attracted most of the gallery of 10,000 as he chopped up Gene Littler, Ted Kroll and Bob Rosburg to force into the lead. Ignoring intermittent sunshine and showers, Snead boosted his total to 29 points as the best Thomson could do was win four for a second place total of 26.

Green Cove Springs, Fla. — (U.P.) — An 18-year-old sailor was held without bond Saturday on a charge of murdering a surgeon from the Army's Walter Reed Hospital in Washington.

The victim, Capt. Edward C. Branson, 31, of Washington, chief resident of orthopedic surgery at the big Walter Reed Army Medical Center, was found bludgeoned to death in a wood near here.

Pleads Innocent
Robert Emmett of Gilroy, Calif., an airman apprentice at the Jacksonville Naval Air Station pleaded innocent at an arraignment and was held in the county jail.

Clay County Judge T. J. Rivers said Branson apparently was killed two days ago. His body was found about 200 feet off U.S. highway 17 in a wooded area Friday after Emmett surrendered to Naval authorities. The doctor was beaten on the head and face with a four-foot hickory stick, Rivers said.

Emmett charged Branson made "advances" toward him after they met in a liquor store, police said.

Pair Fail in Bid to Swim Strait of Juan De Fuca

Victoria, B. C. — (U.P.) — Canadian co-ed Pat Russell and husky United States logger Bert Thomas failed Saturday in their bid to become the first swimmers to conquer the treacherous 18-mile strait of Juan De Fuca between here and Port Angeles, Wash.

The 18-year-old University of British Columbia student was pulled exhausted and in tears from the 47-degree water after pacing Thomas for eight miles of the swim that has never been completed. She was returned to Victoria and taken to a hospital where doctors treated her for exhaustion and shock.

Became Too Exhausted
Thomas, a former U.S. Marine,

struck ahead doggedly through the choppy strait that was flecked into whitecaps by a 12 mile-an-hour offshore wind. But he became too exhausted and was taken from the water at 3:22 a.m.

Radio reports received here said Thomas was only six miles from Port Angeles when he had to give up.

Local residents who have watched swimmer after swimmer go down to defeat in attempts to conquer what is considered one of the world's toughest swims said both of Saturday's contenders covered a greater distance than those who went before them.

Must Swim 40 Miles
Although the strait that runs between the United States and Canada is only 18 miles across, swimmers would have to travel about 40 miles to get across. Strong currents add the distance.

Others who have tried and failed to make it include Florence Chadwick of San Diego, Calif., and Winnie Roach Leuzler, a St. Thomas, Ont., housewife.

French Singles To Trabert

Paris — (U.P.) — Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, O., won the men's singles crown in the French Tennis championships for the second year in a row yesterday with a 2-6, 6-1, 6-4, 6-2 victory over Sven Davidson of Sweden.

A U.S. bid to win the women's title was balked, however, by Angela Mortimer of England,

who defeated Dorothy Head Knode of Alameda, Calif., 2-6, 7-5, 10-8, at Roland Garros stadium.

The victory made 24-year-old Trabert the second Yank ever to win the French title two years running. Frankie Parker was the first, performing the feat in 1948 and 1949.

In the semi-finals of mixed doubles, Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., and Gordon Forbes of South Africa defeated Beryl Penrose and George Worthington of Australia, 6-2, 7-5.

Stanford Beats Bears For 1st Win Since 1917

Redwood City, Calif. — (U.P.) — Stanford's crew pushed to the front at the halfway mark Saturday and stayed there to defeat California by two and one-half lengths for the first Indian victory over the Bears in a dual race since 1917.

The so-called "orphans" of Stanford university, which does not give the crew program financial support, were clocked in 15 minutes and 26 seconds over a smooth three mile course. Cal's time was 10 seconds slower.

A crowd of about 5,000 lining the shores of twisting Redwood creek watched to two shells battle for the lead for the first mile and one-half before the Indians surged ahead by a quarter of a length with a beat of 31 strokes per minute.

The cadence was raised to Stanford 34 and California 35 as the boats clicked toward the finish with the Indians safely in charge after rounding the last curve.

Baker Residents Vote Down Gas System Plan

Baker — (U.P.) — A proposal to allow this eastern Oregon town to issue a \$1,040,000 in bonds to finance a natural gas system was defeated by 252 votes in a special election Friday.

Residents voted 1123 to 871 against the controversial proposal, according to unofficial returns.

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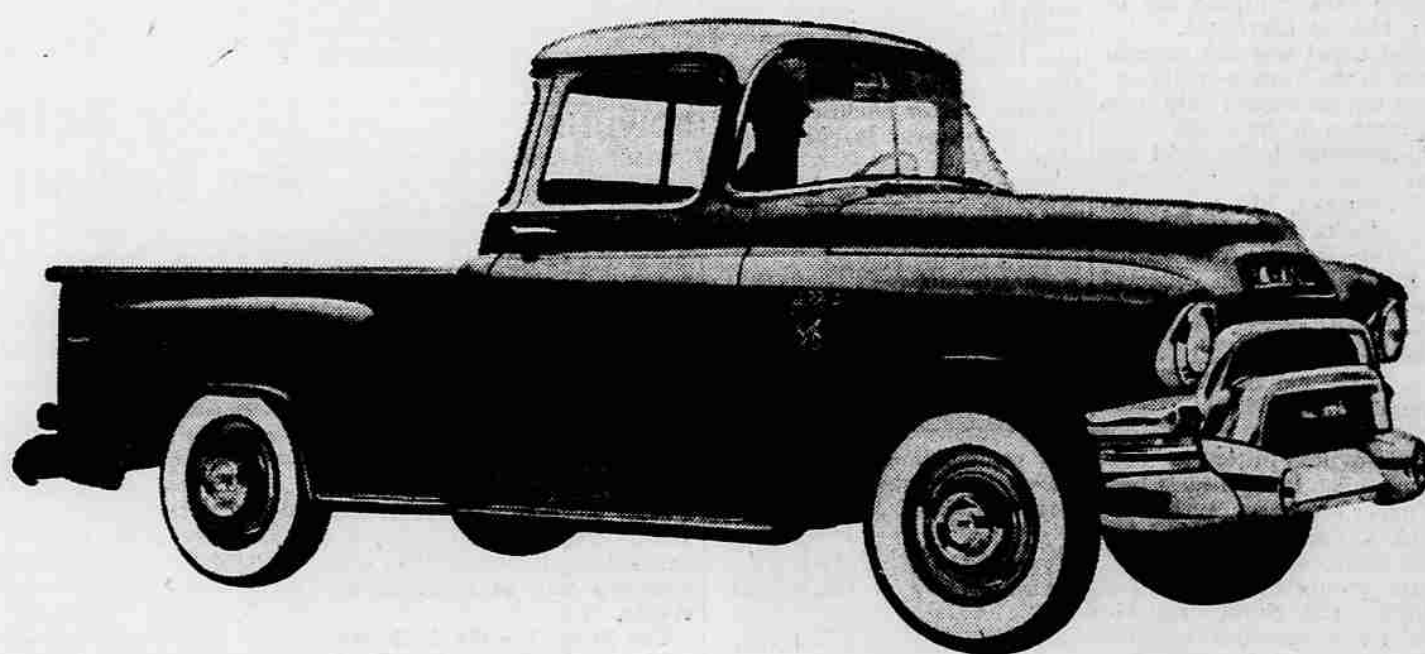
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Residents of Area Hit by Tornadoes Receive New Scare

Residents of tornado-torn Kansas and Oklahoma got a scare late Friday when funnel clouds were sighted in the two states.

But they turned out to be nothing more than pending thundershowers, which drenched the central portion of the nation early Saturday.

Funnels Sighted
Two tornado-like funnels were sighted 50 to 80 miles west of Hutchinson, Kan., and two were reported to have reached ground level near Larned, Kan., about 60 miles west of Hutchinson.

Another tornado was reported near Gage, Okla., in the extreme northwestern part of the state. Hail fell from one thundershower in extreme southwestern Oklahoma. No injuries were reported, however.

Recent Storm Deadly
It was just last week that vicious tornadoes lashed Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, leaving 117 dead, wiping out towns and causing millions of dollars worth of damage.

Thundershowers were general early Saturday from northern Texas to the Dakotas and the upper Mississippi valley. The heaviest rainfall was recorded at Mineral Wells, Tex., 1.63 inches.

Temperatures ranged from a mild 82 degrees at Thermal, Calif., to 37 at Phillipsburg, Pa., and 36 at Butte, Mont.

Automation Said Improving Position of U.S. Workers

San Francisco — (U.P.) — John B. Shallenberger, an official of the Stanford Research Institute, says American workers should welcome—rather than dread—increasing automation in industry.

Debates Issue

Shallenberger spoke Friday at the closing session of the 82nd annual forum of the National Conference of Social Work. He debated the issue of automation with Stanley H. Ruttenberg, of Washington, the CIO's director of education and research.

The research institute official scoffed at the suggestion that the increase of the use of mechanical tools would mean widespread unemployment.

"In the short run, the cumulative effect of automation and all other technological benefits conceivable in scientific laboratories today could not possibly, within the next 10 years disemploy as many people as will find themselves without jobs by the end of this summer if the Ford workers go on strike," he said.

Would Be Fewer Jobs
"Furthermore, if there had been no mechanization and no automation in the last 20 years, there would be 90 per cent fewer persons employed in the automotive, steel and electrical industries than we now have."

Some 5,000 social workers attended the week-long convention.

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
