Doctor, Family Attend Graduation In Salem Today

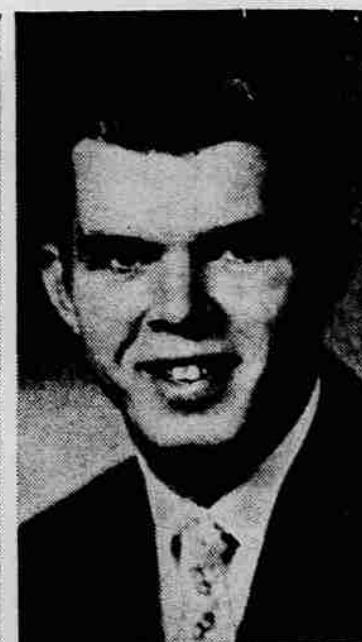
