You could greet your guests in the vestibule of the church, after the ceremony is over, instead of having a real reception.

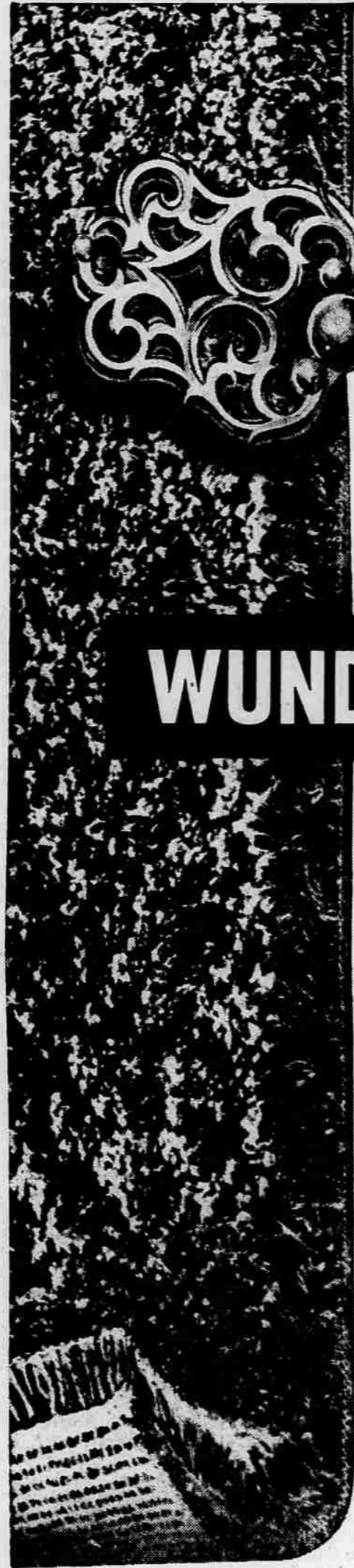

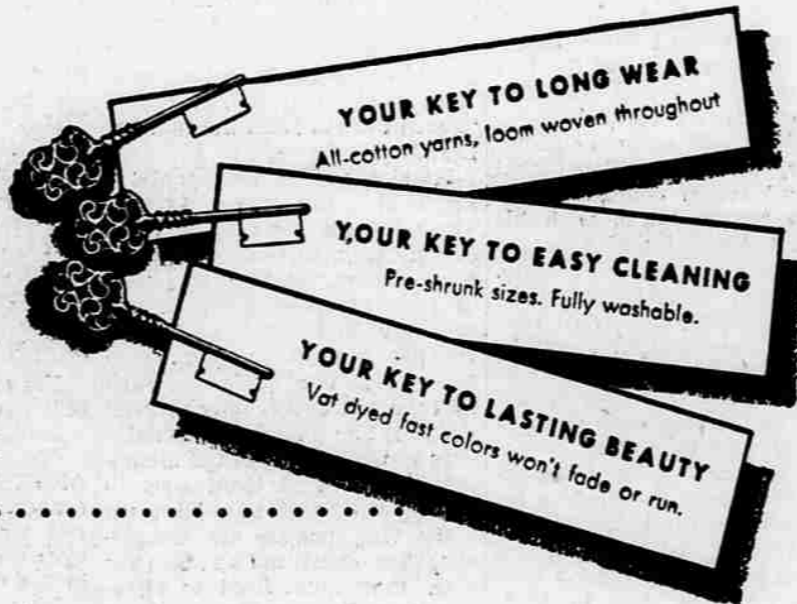
