

Newk's 10th Triumph Boosts Dodger Margin; Has Good Start on 30 Wins

Dazzler Don Newcombe was the best bet in 21 years today to win 30 games in one season. The Dodger ace, with 10 victories and no defeats in the first third of the 1933 season, was in a much more strategic spot than Dizzy Dean of the Cardinals was back in 1934 when he had a 30-7 mark for the "Gas House Gang." Dean had won only seven games at this stage of the race.

No pitcher since Dean has hit the magic 30-game level and of those who came close, none was as well off as Newk at the one-third pole in the race. Robin Roberts of the Phils, who won 28 games in 1932, was 7-3 at this stage. Hal Newhouse of the Tigers, a 29-game winner in 1944, had an 8-4 mark and Bucky Walters of the 1939 Reds, a 27 wins for the campaign, was a modest 7-4 when that season was one-third gone.

Dominatin' Don's record borders on the fantastic when it is considered that he was out two full weeks from April 24 until May 6 with what he called a sore arm. Manager Walt Alston said it might be a sore head, Newk, in the doghouse so securely he was even suspended and fined a day's pay for refusing to pitch batting practice, missed at least three regular turns when his arm was bothering him.

Hurls Four-Hitter
Wednesday night Newcombe flashed a four-hitter against the Redlegs, beating them 3-1 and also contributing two hits to boost his batting average to .400. He struck out seven and walked none and missed a shutout on Ted Kluszewski's 16th homer. In 81 innings he has walked only nine batters.

Wanta hear more? He retired the last 16 men to face him, scored the first run, drove in the final one. And all in a cold night-long drizzle.

The victory put Brooklyn nine full games ahead of the second place Cubs who suffered a 2-1 defeat at Pittsburgh when Dale Long lashed a ninth inning homer. The Giants staged 13½ games back by topping the

Braves 5-4, in 10 innings. St. Louis at Philadelphia was rained out.

Boston, which only won two games from Cleveland all last season, made it two in a row and three out of seven so far for 1933 by topping the Indians, 5-4, in 12 innings. The first-place Yankees failed to take advantage of Cleveland's loss, dropping a 3-1 decision to the Tigers in Detroit because Bob Turley again had trouble with wildness and dropped his third game in a row. Chicago also blew a chance to gain, dropping a 3-2 decision to last-place Baltimore when Hoot Evers hit an eight-

inning homer. Kansas City edged Washington, 3-2, when old war-horse Enos Slaughter hit a pinch-single with the bases loaded in the ninth.

Pitching Duel
Long's homer at Pittsburgh gave rookie Ronnie Kline an eight-hit triumph, his third. He struck out eight in a duel with Bob Rush, who struck out nine and gave up but five hits before going out for a ninth inning pinch hitter.

Bobby Hofman hit a pinch-single to deliver the winning run for the Giants after errors by Alvin Dark and rookie Gail Harris gave Milwaukee five "outs" and

two unearned runs in the ninth. Harris earlier hit a homer, his first.

Jim Piersall's fourth hit, a double, and Sam Dente's fumble and wild throw on a grounder by Billy Goodman gave Boston its winning run. Gene Stephens hit a three-run Boston homer. Vic Wertz, Ralph Kiner and Al Rosen hit Cleveland home runs.

Turley walked 10 including four in a weird fourth when Detroit scored twice. Rookie Frank Lary gave up eight hits and struck out six to win his sixth game.

Slaughter's drive gave Cloyd Boyer, a six-hit triumph and broke up a duel with Bob Porterfield. Clint Courtney in his first time at bat for Washington hit a homer while Harry Simpson homered for K.C.

The homer by Evers gave Don Johnson a well-earned relief victory for Baltimore. He pitched four hit balls for the seven innings he worked.

Seven All-Americans will be in the lineup when the Erv Lind Florists girls' softball team of Portland clashes with the Klamath Falls girls, Oregon champions, at Fairgrounds park here Thursday night, June 16. Game time is 8 o'clock.

The Florists, former world champions who are given an excellent chance to regain their laurels in the world tournament at Portland in August, are said to be 25 per cent stronger than last year when they lost out in the finals.

Ez Charles Victor Over John Holman

Cincinnati, O. — (U.P.)—Former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles, fresh from an avenging victory over big Johnny Holman, said today he would resume his campaign for another title shot "in four or five weeks." "I'll fight anybody — Don Cockell, Nino Valdes or Archie Moore," declared 33-year-old Ezzard who turned the tables on Holman of Chicago Wednesday night with a unanimous 10-round decision at the Music Hall.

Holman, 27, had stopped the ex-champ in the ninth round at Miami Beach on April 27, but Wednesday night in their nationally televised and broadcast return bout he was practically handcuffed by Ezzard's change in style.

Instead of fighting upright as usual, Charles showed his hometown fans he could go into an opponent head down—in Rocky Marciano fashion — and press him at close quarters. Holman, who needs plenty of room for his looping punches, could get little power or accuracy into his blows.

There were no knockdowns. Ezzard, favored at 9-5, was hurt only once, by an overhand right to his head in the fourth round. But he came out fighting in the fifth. He gave Johnny a body beating in nearly every session.

At 195½ pounds, Charles was two pounds heavier than in their first bout. Holman at 202, was three-fourths of a pound lighter.

It was the 12th win in 16 games for Bobby Bragan's crew, touted before the season as one of the teams to beat. It left them in fourth place, a half game behind Oakland and a half game ahead of San Francisco.

Garber, right-handed fast-baller, fanned eight and walked two in Hollywood to post the first PCL one-hitter of the season. Angel right fielder Hal Rice hit a solid single with two out in the fourth for the only safety off the Hollywood pitcher.

Garber (6-5) lost his shutout in the ninth inning when Manuel Trabous was safe on a two-base error by shortstop Dick Smith and tallied on Gene Mauch's sacrifice fly.

Hollywood sewed up the game in the fifth as Lee Walls hit a two-run homer and Jack Lohrke hit a two-run double.

Loser Bubba Church (0-3) hit Curt Roberts in the head with a pitched ball in the first inning. The Hollywood second baseman was taken to a hospital for X-rays. Club physician Dr. Maurice Small said Roberts suffered a concussion but was "resting comfortably."

Elsewhere in the league, Seattle rallied in the last two innings to turn back league-leading San Diego, 5-3; San Francisco shut out Oakland, 8-0, on Bob Greenwood's three-hitter, and Sacramento beat Portland, 6-3.
