

'Johnny Appleseed' of Orient Loads Up With Garden Seed for Asian Poor Folks

Los Angeles — (U.P.)—Aloysius Eugene Francis Patrick Mozier, a Texan who has strayed pretty far from home, came into port to pick up some garden seed. He'll be sailing again soon in his role of "Johnny Appleseed" of the Orient.

"Paddy" Mozier — in boots and Stetson — has been running his own point four program for three years. He has given away over a million packages of vegetable seed to poor Japanese, Chinese and Koreans.

No telling how many vegetable gardens are thriving because of Mozier or how much good will he has sown among hungry farmers on both sides of the Bamboo Curtain.

"The people over there need help and friends," Paddy said. "I'm going to keep up this program until they get back on their feet."

Paddy's diplomatic endeavor is financed by contributions from service clubs. He is a member of Rotary and Kiwanis himself, and makes frequent speaking appearances. When he passes the hat, the proceeds go into packets of seed—corn, peas, turps and the like.

A retired Navy man, Paddy was born and raised near Houston and shuttles between the United States and Far Eastern ports as an engineering officer for the American President Lines. He still wears a broad-brimmed stetson, a western jacket and trousers and black cowboy boots.

"This hat," he said, rubbing the soft felt brim, "is my pass. They all know me. There's two words those people know, too—Texas and cowboy."

He figures his costume has helped guarantee him safe passage through Communist territory. "When I cross over they ask me to dinner. We talk about the little things. They tell me no harm is going to come to me."

"They told me once I was the No. 2 Will Rogers and that made me feel kind of good."

Paddy got interested in helping people of the Orient in 1952 when he came across a starving little girl in the streets of Pusan, Korea. He picked her up to take her to a hospital. She died in his arms.

"I made up my mind right then and there that I was going to do something for those poor people," he said.

Paddy has organized 4-H clubs in Singapore, Karachi and Japan but he has a new idea up his fourbutton sleeve now. He wants to start a children's hospital in Pusan.

"Those little kids need help just like their parents," he said. "The gardens I helped start are going good now so one of these days I'll be working on this new idea."

Oregon Grange Delegates Tackle Hells Canyon Issue

Klamath Falls — (U.P.)—The Oregon State Grange, in convention here, was to tackle the Hells Canyon controversy today when it considers a resolution submitted by the Sixes Grange.

The resolution, favoring construction of a single high dam at the Hells canyon site with federal funds, has already been adopted by Hood River, Coos, Linn, Benton, Jefferson, Klamath, and Multnomah Pomona Granges.

Resolutions adopted so far by

the convention, out of some 100 introduced, were those favoring use of pari mutuel racing funds exclusively for fairs and stock shows and not for the general fund of the state; use of butter instead of margarine in veterans hospitals.

Another resolution adopted would ask the return of the Bonneville Power administration's high line in the Klamath Falls

area to the federal government. The resolution claimed that the line was acquired by the California Oregon Power Co., "without moral or legal right, thus blight the Klamath basin with the burden of costly electric power."

The Grange decided to ask Congress to release surplus wheat for livestock and poultry feed at a reduced price.

Stepdaughter Tries To Prejudice Family

An adult stepdaughter can be a real problem in a household. How to handle this problem tactfully is the question raised by the woman who writes:

(Q) "Two years ago, I married a divorced man with three grown children, all daughters."

Two were married and in homes of their own. The third was engaged and had planned to be married before we were. But she broke her engagement shortly before our marriage. I hesitated to go through with our marriage at that time because I was afraid she would cause trouble for us, but my husband persuaded me to go ahead with our plans, saying his daughter worked and would be out of the house most of the time. So, against my better judgment, I married him and have lived to regret it.

"This daughter is very antagonistic to me and constantly tells her father things I do or say which are not true. She does the same with her sisters. The result is that they barely speak to me and I am beginning to see a change in my husband's attitude toward me. He always sticks up for his daughter and makes me feel that I am in the wrong for everything that happens. I would like to add that this daughter has no boyfriends so I see no hope of change in this situation in the immediate future. What would you suggest that I do?"

(A) I am sure that your stepdaughter will, sooner or later, marry and leave home. Then you will not have to contend with the problems you now have. However, until this time comes, you must see to it that your marriage is not broken up by her, as she seems to be trying to do.

You should not expect your husband to side with his daughter against you. Have a heart-to-heart talk with him about this matter, reminding him that he urged you to go ahead with your plans for marriage and of his assurance that his daughter would be out of the house most of the time and hence would not be a disturbing influence. If he is unwilling to take a stand with his daughter and inform her that he will not tolerate her interference in your life, then pack your bags and leave until he promises to straighten things out to your satisfaction.
