Rail 'Piggy-Back' System Praised

Buffalo, N. Y. —(U.P.)—Perry M. Shoemaker, president of the Lackawanna Railroad, believes the new "piggy-back" system of transporting loaded truck-trailers on rail flatcars has a great potential.

During a visit to Buffalo, Shoemaker said that the Lackawanna "expects to be handling whole trainloads of freight-loaded truck-trailers within the next year."

Disclosing that the rail line was spending about \$750,000 initially for "piggy-back" equipment, he noted that the expenditure included purchase of 100 truck-trailers "of our own" and costs of converting 80 additional flatcars to haul them.

"By early April, we'll have 120 piggy-back flatcars and 200 truck-trailers we either own or lease," he said.

Shoemaker said the Lackawanna is winning back freight business it lost to its highway competitors years ago, "and we haven't begun to get all the possibilities out of the new service."
