

Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — One of the victims Davy Crockett mowed down with his coonskin cap is a bright-faced young man who every Friday stands in line to collect his \$30 unemployment insurance.

Until Davy began grinning bears to death on television, Lyn Osborn was Cadet Happy on "Space Patrol" and one of TV's biggest idols to children.

But "Space Patrol's" fickle fans decided to change headgear. The small fry junked their space helmets in favor of coonskin caps.

Today Cadet Happy's rocket ship, Terr V, stands dusty and unwanted in a scenery shed at ABC-TV studios — a symbol to the short loyalties of pint-sized TV viewers.

Good Company
And Osborn, who was making \$40,000 a year, is jobless.

"But at the unemployment insurance office I stand behind some 'Ramar of the Jungle' actors so I'm in good company," cracked Osborn today.

"And the line is loaded with old 'Space Patrol' heavies—villains from Jupiter and Saturn." "Space Patrol" bit the dust 14 weeks ago because the sponsor wanted another type of show. Osborn thinks this had nothing to do with the switch to coonskin caps, but insiders at ABC-TV say otherwise.

Now Osborn is making the rounds of movie and TV producers to convince them he can do something else besides fly through space.

"I'd like to play heavies, psychopathic killers, maybe," he reflected. "I don't know whether to take advantage of my space character in getting jobs, or try to get away from it."

"Unfortunately, many producers don't think of me as an actor, but a space man. It's the influence of their kids."

Quick Fame
Osborn started "Space Patrol" fresh from dramatic school, and quickly rose to fame. He received a cut of "Space Patrol" space suits, helmets, ray guns and other items sold to kiddies.

"But the merchandising business is gone," he said.

He was a star of outer space for five years on TV and four on radio. Film stars begged for his

Try To Refloat British Sub Fails

Portland, England—(U.P.)—An attempt to "blow" the sunken British submarine Sidon to the surface with compressed air failed today.

The submarine exploded and sank yesterday with a loss of 13 lives.

Royal Navy divers reported that the torpedo room explosion which sent the 1000-ton submarine to the bottom of Portland harbor had punctured the conning tower.

Two Navy lifting vessels moved into position over the submarine, lying under 30 feet of water. They will attempt to haul it to the surface with cables.

The conning tower leak was discovered shortly after dawn today and the attempt to "blow" the submarine to the surface was abandoned.

The Admiralty blamed the disaster on the explosion of the powerful propellant that fires the torpedoes from the tube. Three officers and 10 crewmen, including a Canadian, were trapped within the submarine when it plunged beneath the water.

Change in 'Eye-Alone' Approach Claimed Needed To Promote Sales of Furniture

Chicago — (U.P.)—The American public doesn't know how to buy furniture and won't ever learn unless designers change their "eye-alone" approach, a teacher of design said today.

Ray Pearson, an instructor at the Illinois Institute of Design said designers have "gone overboard" on appearance, with chair designers the "worst offenders." Professional buyers then select the chair for sale after "at the most, perching in it for a couple of minutes."

Approach Passed On
"This approach is passed on to the retail customers," Pearson said. "He rarely knows or even cares when he makes the purchase whether the furniture will fulfill his own needs."

"If he sees pictures of certain furniture in magazines or newspapers, or if his neighbor has bought it, he'll buy just about anything, including the autograph, children trailed him down the street."

Today as we strolled through Beverly Hills not one moppet besieged him.

"Anybody want to buy 500 8-by-10 fan pictures of me as a space cadet?" the deposed 30th century hero mumbled.

"I'll trade them for a couple of Davy Crockett pictures. The rate of exchange has gone up."

one-position' chairs so popular now."

Pearson was particularly critical of what he called "one of the darlings" of the furniture industry, the bucket chair. There are several variations of this chair, he said, but all generally have a moulded back and scooped out seat of plywood or metal.

"They're beautiful to look at," Pearson said, "but just as uncomfortable as the airplane bucket seat they were patterned after."

"The airplane seat was designed to hold a person in one position. If he got cramped it didn't matter. But it does matter if you get cramped sitting in a chair in your own home."

Why Torture Yourself?
"The human body wasn't designed to sit in one position," he said. "Why torture ourselves?"

Pearson said he is looking to the International Home Furnishings summer market, beginning at Chicago June 20, for an indication "that designers are finally learning that a piece of furniture doesn't have to be ugly to be functional."

"There's a real need for furniture in the middle and lower price class that is both functional and good to look at," he said, "and until designers provide this, they're falling down on the job."

The above matter having come on to be heard, upon motion of petitioners appearing by Frank Van Dyke their counsel, for an order setting the time and place certain for the election to be held for the incorporation of the Elk City Water District and making the arrangements therefor:

It appearing that on the 31st day of May, 1955, final public hearing was had, at which time no persons came forward to enter objections to the proposed incorporation and at which time the court made certain findings of fact entered of record herein, and the court being fully advised in the premises and good cause appearing therefor:

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS CONSIDERED AND ORDERED that the petition filed for the incorporation of the domestic water supply municipal corporation, known as the Elk City Water District, within the following described exterior boundaries:

IT IS CONSIDERED AND ORDERED that the necessary arrangements shall be made for the said election and that the County Clerk be directed, and he is hereby directed, to make the said arrangements for the election and that she shall, further, certify the appointment of three judges for the election, who are to be electors of the district sought to be incorporated; and

IT IS CONSIDERED AND ORDERED that a copy of this order shall be posted for four (4) successive weeks prior to the election, in three public places within the district proposed to be incorporated; and also that this order shall be published once a week, for four (4) successive weeks, prior to the said election, in the Medford Mail Tribune and that said posting and publication shall be sufficient notice to the electors, of said election.
