Miss Cox is widely known in Medford, having been principal of Lincoln school for several years before her retirement.

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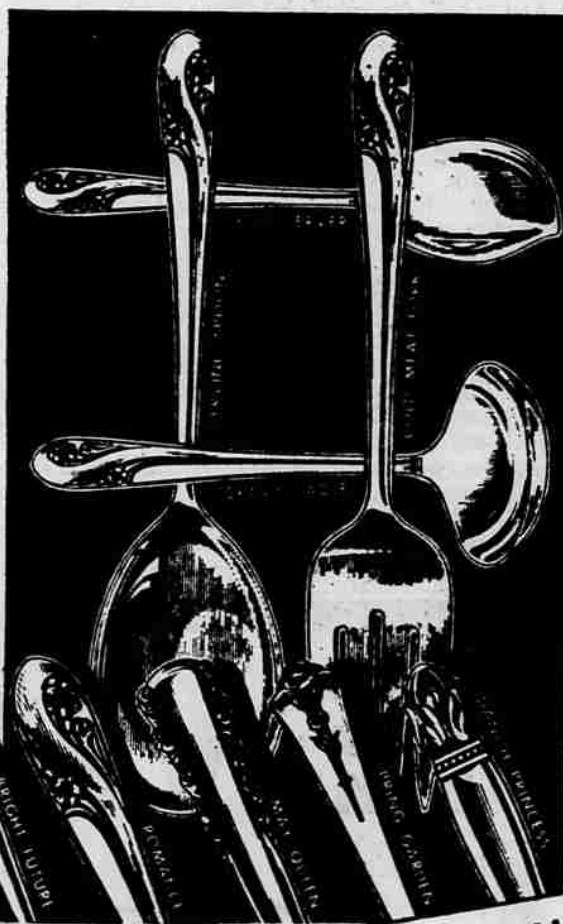
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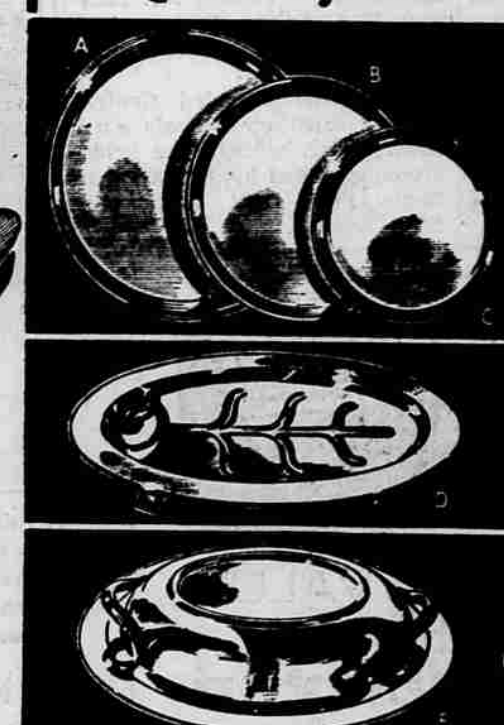


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
