

# Winger, Maxwell Drop Links Fray To Harrington, Williams

George Harrington and Al Williams, who had the advantage of familiarity with the home links, subdued a pair of top-rated touring professionals, Billy Maxwell and Bo Winger, yesterday in an exhibition best ball golf match at Rogue Valley Country club.

A small but enthusiastic gallery saw the home course pair take a 4 and 3 decision over the visitors, who were testing the Medford fairways and tricky greens for the first time.

Harrington, amateur and the Rogue valley manager, set the medal pace on the front nine as the Medford men took a 2 up advantage. He stroked a three-under-par 34 while Winger and Maxwell were collecting 36s. Williams, the club pro, was one over par for this portion of the fracas. However, he won two of the three holes, with birds, that the home duo took on the front lap. And on the back side his par on every hole, while the other players faltered, steadied the Medfordites to their victory.

**Course Considered Good**

Pars on the 11th and 13th greens gave the RVCC divotmen their 4 up spread. The regular match ended on the 15th hole where Maxwell and Williams halved with three.

Maxwell, from Odessa, Tex., and Winger, from Oklahoma City, Okla., agreed that the Rogue valley course is a good one. While they took a setback, they, nevertheless, fired creditable scores on the unfamiliar layout. Maxwell, the steadier of the two, was one over par with 73 and Winger, who had a tendency to spray his shots, as the foursome played out the full 18 holes for the spectators.

The Rogue valley vets, Harrington and Williams, each had 73s at the conclusion of the round which saw some strokes conceded.

In medal best ball the home club duo had a 67 to 70 edge. At the end of the 15 holes of match play Harrington was one under par, Williams one over, Maxwell two above and Winger three over.

Williams sank a seven or eight foot putt on the first hole for a birdie that gave the Medford team a lead it never relinquished. Maxwell missed a bird when his putt stopped on the rim of the cup. The visitors made fine approaches on No. 2 but couldn't drop eight and 10 foot shots to tie up the tussle.

**Take 3-Up Lead**

Harrington ran the count to 2 up with a 15-foot putt on No. 3 green. Winger came close with a 17-footer on 3. Williams

made it 3 up on No. 4. He followed a fine tee shot to the green by canning a 13 to 14-foot putt for a birdie two. Harrington and Maxwell almost dropped in their pellets for twos.

All four men got fours on No. 5 Williams came close to a three on a 60-foot try. The status quo was kept on No. 6 when Harrington plunked a 12-footer and Maxwell a four-footer for birdie three. The rivals halved No. 7 with pars by Winger and Harrington. The visitors gained back a hole when Winger had a great approach on No. 8 and put in his short tap for a birdie three. Headed for the same green Williams drove into a hole among trees behind a screen. He picked up and took a bogey five on his card.

On No. 9 Harrington matched pars by Winger and Maxwell to halve the hole.

Over the next six greens Winger had four bogies, Maxwell three and Harrington two.

**Trap Trouble**

Maxwell's par enabled a halve on No. 10 but on 11 both the visitors had trap trouble. Winger's recovery went over the green and Maxwell's plopped on the side of the apron. The home boys took the hole with pars. The opponents broke even on 12 when Winger matched pars with George and Al. On No. 13 the Rogue valley team won with pars when the visitors missed short putts. Williams got a par along with Maxwell and Winger for a split on No. 14.

The two pros termed the Rogue Valley links one of the two or three nicest they have played on since starting the circuit last December. At a clinic after the exhibition Winger described the course as interest-

ing. "It's got a lot of shots and is something to be proud of," he said. Both men demonstrated shots and Winger answered questions.

Maxwell, eighth ranking money winner this season on the pro circuit, and Winger, 10th ranking in earnings, were en route to the Western Open which begins Thursday in Portland. They had just competed in the United States Open at San Francisco. Both were in the money.

Winger won the Baton Rouge Open this year and Maxwell, 1951 national amateur champion, took the Azalea Open laurels.

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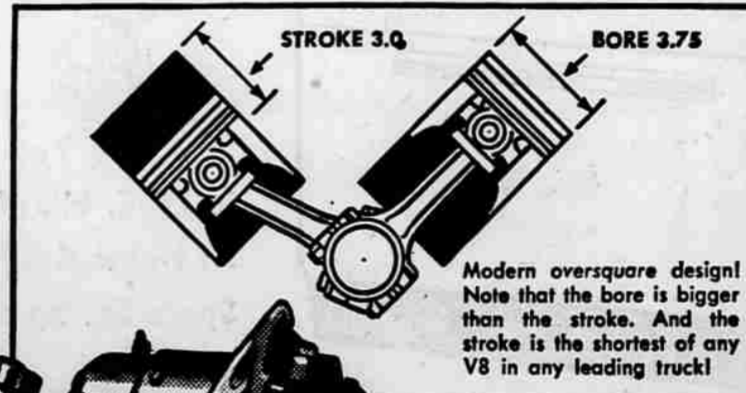
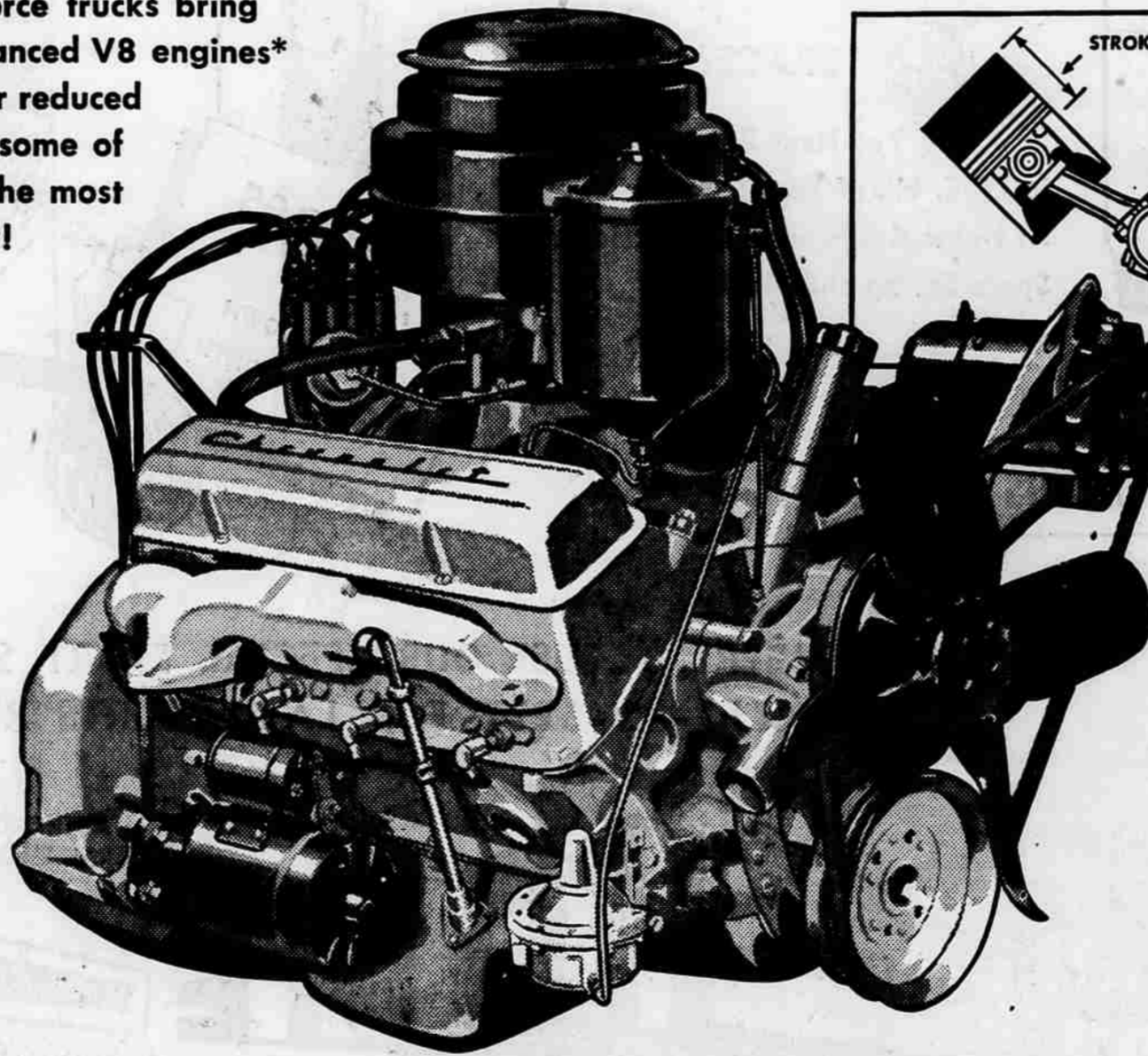
