Chapel Hill, N.C. (U.P.)—Top-seeded Sammy Giammalva of the University of Texas, continuing his advance through the 71st annual NCAA tennis championships, met Bill Demas of California in today's fourth round of the tournament.

All seven remaining seeded players advanced Tuesday but third-seeded Jacques Grigry of Southern California and fifth-seeded Bill Quillian of Washington were extended to three sets. Grigry dropped his first set to Ellis Bryant of Arizona 5-7 but took the next two 6-2, 6-2. Quillian bowed to Dick Ransing of Yale 4-6 but bounced back to win 6-1, 6-0.

Giammalva beat Gary Peterson of Arizona 6-2, 6-2, and second-seeded Clifton Mayne beat Big 10 champion Warren Mueller of Wisconsin 6-2, 6-2. Fourth-seeded Jack Frost of Stanford disposed of Bobby Green of Duke 6-0, 6-1.

Golfers Tune For Tourney At Portland

Portland (U.P.)—Favorites of the fairways from throughout the nation took their final practice licks today for the \$15,000, 72-hole Western Open which starts tomorrow and runs through Sunday at the Portland Golf Club.

Slammin' Sammy Sneed, Dr. Cary Middlecoff, Tommy Bolt, Julius Boros, Gene Littler, Doug Ford, Gardiner Dickinson Jr., and Ted Kroll were among the favorites as some 180 golfers were on hand for the four-day event.

Sneed, who turned in a 64 with three eagles Monday in a practice round, had trouble with his putting yesterday and was over par. Most of the entries didn't turn in scores, but Bolt fashioned a 67 and Celestino Tugot, the Philippine champion, shot a 66.

Fleck Not Entered

Two finalists in the recent National Open were not present. Open Champ Jack Fleck flew home to a welcome in Davenport, Ia., while the man he defeated, Ben Hogan, did not enter.

Host pro Larry Lamberger said he believed a 275 score for the 72-hole tournament would be enough to win. Hogan shot a record 261 here in the 1945 Portland Open but Byron Nelson who finished second, was 14 strokes behind.

Lloyd Mangrum, who won the Western Open in a playoff in Cincinnati last year, is not competing this year due to a rib injury.

The Western Open starts at 7 a.m. PST tomorrow with 18 holes scheduled each day through Sunday.

Whitey Lockman On Top in Voting

Chicago (U.P.)—Handyman Whitey Lockman of the New York Giants took over the lead today as the fans' choice for the left field berth on the National League All-Star baseball team.

The first baseman-outfielder replaced Bob Speake of the Chicago Cubs by 11,654 votes in the latest tabulation in the annual poll. Lockman had 151,886 votes compared to Speake's 140,232. Speake, even though he has been sitting on the bench in recent weeks, had taken over the lead earlier on the strength of his early-season showing.

The Cubs, however, still have three of the eight leading positions—second baseman Gene Baker, third baseman Randy Jackson and shortstop Ernie Banks.

West Michigan Pitcher Signed

Kansas City, Mo. (U.P.)—Miki Schwartzkoff, who compiled a fabulous 50-5 record in high school and at Western Michigan, has been signed by the Kansas City Athletics and assigned to Columbus Jets in the Triple-A International league. LEMON CHUCKS 10th VICTORY FOR TRIBE; NEWK POSTS 12th WIN; NY GIANTS LOSE AGAIN

Bob Lemon, Cleveland's pitching peach, was half-way toward his seventh 20-victory season today, a goal which would make him baseball's most consistent big winner since the heyday of Robert Moses Grove—20 years ago.

No other pitcher has had that many 20-victory seasons since Grove, the great Philadelphia lefty, did it for the eighth time in 1935.

And if Lemon makes it he will be in a select group of immortals headed by Christy Mathewson with 13, Walter Johnson 12, Pete Alexander 9, Eddie Plank 8, and iron man Joe McGinnity 7. Of all pitchers in the modern era of baseball since 1900, those are the only ones who surpass Lemon now.

For an uneasy moment last night when he became the first American League pitcher to win 10 games with a 3-1 job over Baltimore, it looked as if Lemon with his margin of triumph on his chances were in jeopardy because he injured his left thigh baserunning in the seventh. Pitcher Ray Narleski replaced him and held the Orioles. Later, it developed that Lemon's injury was slight and he will miss no action. Al Smith provided Lemon with a two-run homer.

Mickey Mantle hit one of his longest homers yet, 486 feet to dead center in a 6-2 Yankee triumph over the Athletics. Run-ruper Chicago kept pace with a 6-1 victory at Washington, sixth in a row for Virgil Trucks. Boston came from behind to defeat Detroit, 5-4 on Ted Williams' three-run homer.

In the National League, Richie Ashburn hit two homers for the first time in his career, the second with a man on in the ninth to give the Phillies a 10-8 victory at St. Louis. Cincinnati sent the world champ Giants down to their sixth straight loss, 10-1, Milwaukee made it five victories in a row by beating Pittsburgh, 6-4, and Brooklyn's "win-it-by-August" wrecking crew topped the Cubs, 7-2.
