The Medford student will return to Stanford in the fall for his sophomore year.

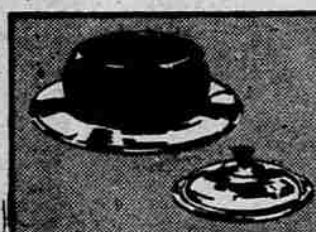
College Editor At UN Session In San Francisco
