Rochester University Becomes Coeducational

Rochester, N. Y.—(U.P.)—A quarter century of separate campuses for male and female University of Rochester students will be a thing of the past next fall.

Women students will invade the men's campus on the Genesee River in one of the biggest collegiate transplantations ever attempted.

The Women's college of the University has been located three miles from the men's campus. University officials, however, decided that a single co-educational institution was preferable—and there haven't been any cries of anguish from the men, either.

A total of 550 co-eds and 250 faculty members are involved in the move.

Madronos in Texas Said Disappearing

Austin, Tex.—(U.P.)—One of Texas' least known but ornamental trees, the madrone, is disappearing.

The madrone, sometimes called the "squaw leg" because of its smooth reddish trunk, can still be found in the hill country of central Texas, but only where the terrain is rugged and inaccessible. Texas legend has it that the tree does not like civilization.

Nor can the copper-colored tree very similar to the popular mimosa, be transplanted. Practically every known method of propagating from seed or transplanting the young growth from a foot or up has failed.

The madrone, with its delicate pink flowers in the spring and brilliant red berries at Autumn, is usually found in the poorest of soils and invariably on sloping ground. The flowers, berries and leaves make good decorations since they will last for many weeks in fresh water without any discoloration.

This apparent hardness is just as deceptive to the would-be transplant, since the tree dies very slowly and gives the impression it will live after removal.

But the madrone never puts on a new leaf stock after transplanting. Mexican folklore says the "madrone" (mother) tree will always die if moved.
