Akron Grandmother Strikes It Rich With Second Best Uranium Find on Continent

Akron, Ohio—(U.P.)—A casual vacation friendship started 20 years ago blossomed Saturday into a business partnership that could be worth millions.

Mrs. John J. Madigan, a 48-year old grandmother who liked the Canadian "bush" country because it was "so peaceful and quiet," learned last week she is partner in a uranium discovery rated "one of the richest in North America."

"It was all just by accident," the bewildered Mrs. Madigan said. "But don't think it isn't a lot of fun."

She and her husband, a trucking firm executive, started spending summer vacations at Sharbot Lake, Ont., 20 years ago. There they met and became friends with two local residents, Dr. C. J. Whytock and Harvey Adams.

"Last summer they told us they had been looking for uranium," Mrs. Madigan said, "but neither my husband nor I thought much about it."

Four weeks ago, she received a telephone call from Dr. Whytock. He reported possible discovery of uranium, and wanted the couple to buy a geiger counter and come immediately.

They All Laughed
"My husband couldn't go because of his work," she said, "so I tried to interest some friends. They all laughed when I said I was prospecting for uranium."

Two friends, Mrs. Betty Cliff and Mrs. Wileman, finally agreed to accompany her. She and Mrs. Wileman belong to the same women's club. Mrs. Cliff is a son's neighbor.

Mrs. Madigan bought a "Lucky Strike" geiger counter for \$99.50 from an Akron variety store, packed her bags, and drove non-stop to Sharbot Lake.

"The counter clicked away like mad when we went over the area," she said. "The doctor took some specimens into Ottawa and Toronto while the rest of us staked out the claims."

The five of them hired a surveyor to cover some 800 acres. They filed about 40 claims, in their own names and those of relatives.

The report from assayers showed 15 per cent uranium content. Then came a message last week from the Atomic Energy Commission that the field could be one of the richest on the continent. The ore might be worth \$1,500 a ton.

Do It Yourself Mining
"We're trying to interest some American mining firms in the claims," she said. "In this country, the AEC will do the mining."

Geologists Gather Desert War Data

Mohave Desert, Calif. — (U.P.) — A team of geologists has worked on top of blistering mountains and on the sweltering floor of this desolate Southern California desert to gather new information in case American troops ever have to fight in another desert war.

Headed by Dr. John F. Gaines and Dr. Richard F. Logan of the University of California in Los Angeles, the scientists experimented with living conditions in the Primitive Provisional Mountains for the Army's quartermaster corps.

The team set up 14 weather stations at various elevations and made field trips to learn everything possible about the climate, vegetation, and topography of a typical mountain range.

They reported the psychological and physical strain of withstanding winds up to 60 miles an hour wore nerves raw and stretched tempers thin.

Some surprises received by the researchers included the discovery that desert mountain summits are warmer on winter nights than the desert floor. Summertime humidity is considerably higher than in winter, and dark-colored basaltic rock is 30 degrees hotter on a summer day than is light-hued granite.

Pickles Experience Popularity Growth

East Lansing, Mich. — (U.P.) — Pickles have experienced a tremendous growth in popularity in the past 25 years, according to a conference at Michigan State college to the National Pickle Packers league.

Dr. F. W. Fabian, retired MSC scientist, traced the development of the pickle's popularity at the meeting. He pointed to the rise in the consumption of pickles from a few million bushels in 1930 to 12,000,000 in 1952 and predicted that the 1952 figures will be more than doubled in the next 10 years.

Scientific research has led to more and better pickles, according to Dr. Fabian, and laboratory work done at MSC is credited with developing and improving many varieties.
