Several bids were opened at noon yesterday for a 1,000-gallon pumper truck, a 1,000-gallon tank truck, 4,500 feet of fire hose, 20 turnout coats, 20 helmets and several special hose gaskets.

Station Authorized
The White City fire station, which will be built without cost to the district by the White City Realty company, was authorized in a special budget election in the district recently. The district will supply and maintain equipment.

Bids on the pumper truck included American LaFrance Foamite corporation of Elmira, N.Y., \$22,995; Coast Apparatus incorporated, Concord, Calif., \$17,214; Howard Cooper corporation, Portland, \$20,441.05; Van Pelt Equipment company, Oakland, Calif., \$18,267.76; General Fire Truck company, Detroit, \$19,982.5; and W. S. Darley and company, Chicago, \$18,025.

Offers on the tank truck were Coast Apparatus, \$7,681; Howard Cooper, \$7,550, and Neep Equipment company, Portland, \$7,002.30.

Low bid on fire hose was American LaFrance, \$4,330. There were eight other bids.

Laramie, Wyo. —(U.P.)—With luck and no high wind, Forest Service officials believed they could finally put out two forest fires in Medicine Bow National Park forest today. But in the past week, more than 4,000 acres of timber had been destroyed.

The Forest Bureau at Cheyenne foresaw little or no rain in the forest today, but neither did it predict any high winds. Twice last week, high afternoon winds swept the fire past fire lines and ruined the efforts of several hundred men to contain the flames.

He pointed out the 150th anniversary of the expedition is being celebrated this year. One monument would be created on the original site of Fort Clatsop in Oregon near the mouth of the Columbia river. The other would be on the Lolo trail above Lochsa fork of the Clearwater river in Idaho.

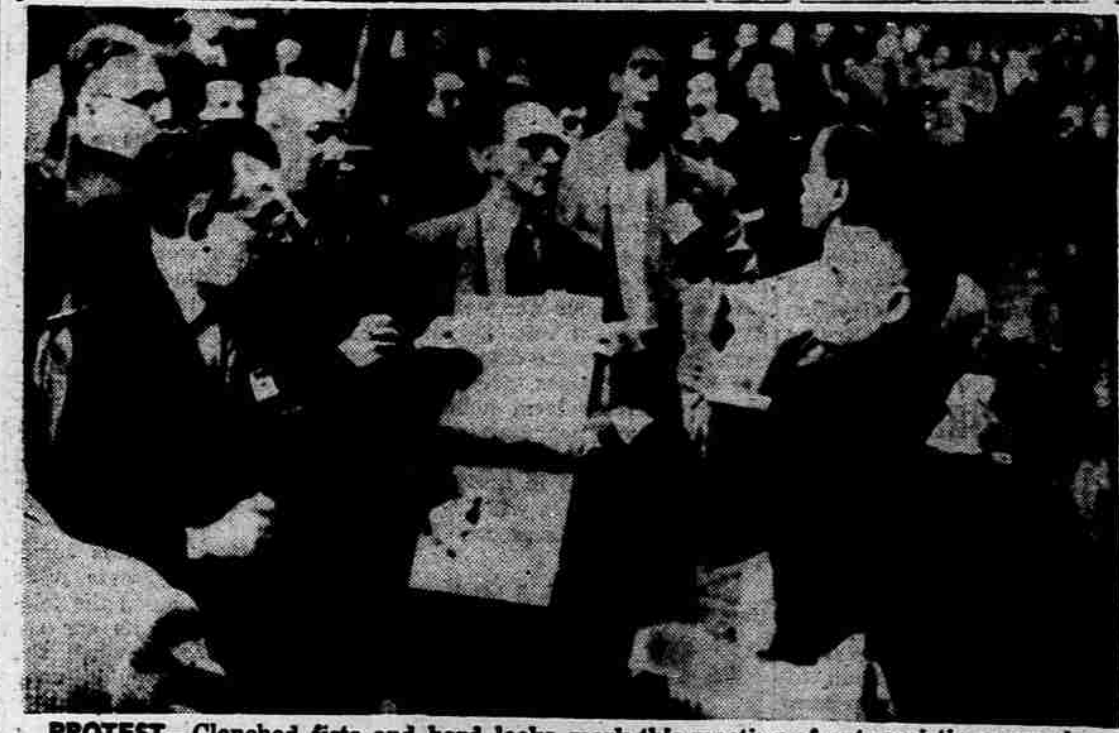

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PROTEST—Clenched fists and hard looks mark this meeting of antagonistic groups in Liege, Belgium, as some 30,000 Catholics marched in protest against the government's school reform bill, which would cut off funds from parochial schools. A mass demonstration against the Socialist-Liberal government proposal paralyzed the city of Brussels in a protest staged by more than 150,000 persons.
