DeVoe Wins; Plays Kabler In Semi Tilt

Seattle—(U.P.)—Eight of the region's top amateur golfers teed off at the Inglewood course here today in the first of three days of 36-hole matches to decide the 1953 Pacific Northwest Golf Association title.

Rod Funseth, Spokane, medalist in qualifying play which ended yesterday with a 72-hole total of 287 and a second-hole sudden-death playoff victory over Tal Smith, went up against Phil Gettchell, Medford, Ore., who placed fifth with 293. Smith also had finished at 287.

Other matches featured Dick Yost against fellow Seattleite Irv Parent; Smith against George Harrington, Medford, Ore., and Jerry Steelsmith, Glendale, Calif., against Bob Roos of California.

Steelsmith finished in a tie for third yesterday with a 76 for a three-day total of 292. Yost also finished with 292. Gettchell had 293, Parent 294, Harrington 295 and Roos 296.

Rogers Hornsby May Buy Seals

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Oscar Salenger and Rogers Hornsby have agreed between themselves to buy the San Francisco Seals if they can get a five-year extension on Seals Stadium.

The lease has three years to go. The stadium is owned by Paul Fagan, former Seals owner who sold out to the "Little Corporation" and its president, Damon Miller, two years ago.

Salenger, a Beverly Hills businessman and former president of the Sacramento Solons, and Hornsby planned to meet with Miller Sunday or Monday to discuss terms. He said Hornsby regards San Francisco and Seattle, where he managed for two years, as the top baseball cities on the West Coast.
