Temperatures Rise Coast to Coast; Europe Swelters

It was hot and humid from coast to coast today, with some light showers in the Midwest and Upper Mississippi Valley providing the only relief — and not much at that.

Temperatures from the high 70s to the 90s were common. At Blythe, Calif., the mercury zoomed to 100 during the night.

Overseas, Europeans continued to suffer from their worst heat wave in 20 years. More than 210 persons have died as a result of it.

Lightning Kills One

At Ascot, England, a freak storm sent lightning flashing into a richly-dressed crowd in front of the royal box at the Royal Ascot Race Course yesterday and killed one person. Thirty others were injured.

Back home, police at Las Vegas, Nev., combed the hot desert for a 13-year-old boy missing since Monday while clad only in swimming trunks and a T-shirt. Planes aided in the search in 100-degree temperatures.

Light rains which fell last night in the Detroit area provided little help for the local drought, but officials said prompt response to Mayor Albert Cobo's appeal to cut water usage to only necessities has helped ease the water crisis.

Heat Blamed for Death

Detroit officials hoped for thundershowers today, but the weatherman forecast a high of 93. The heat was blamed for the death of Ike Williams, 67, who collapsed and died of heat prostration while watching a Detroit sandlot ball game.

There was one cooling thought, however. At Memphis, Tenn., a convention group will have a snowball fight in a city park Wednesday. Some 500 snowballs will be shipped from Akron, O., where they've been kept in cold storage.

Peck, while visiting here making arrangements for the opening, paid tribute to Claude and Robert McIntire of Rogue Valley Land company for their aid in finding a suitable building location, and to James A. Elliott, the contractor, who completed the building ahead of schedule.

The Reese Creek Renegades met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Moore July 12.

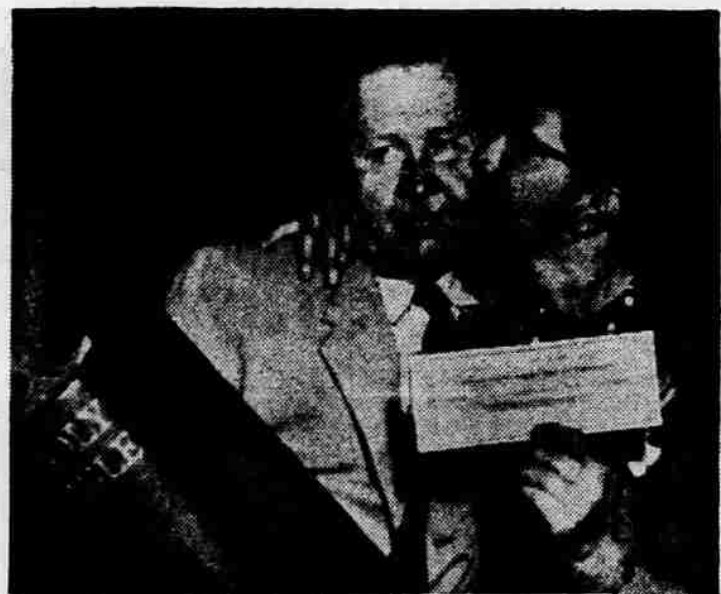
President Ronnie Nelson and leader Cliff Moore explained some pointers on how to clip a calf or cow.

Deportation Trial Of Bridges Develops Into Contradictions

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The denaturalization trial of West Coast labor leader Harry Bridges has developed into a series of sharp and direct contradictions in the testimony of government and defense witnesses.

The 54-year-old president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union is fighting the government's fourth attempt to have him deported to his native Australia for falsely denying affiliation with the Communist Party when he received his citizenship in 1945.

Yesterday Bruce Jones, an explosive, snuff-chewing witness for the defense, took the stand to challenge the testimony of star government witness John Schomaker.

Schomaker, an admitted ex-Communist, testified earlier that Jones recruited Bridges into the Communist Party over a cup of coffee. But Jones denied that he recruited the longshore leader in the party, said he had never collected party dues from Bridges nor turned over an application by the defendant to Communist Party officials.

When Jones, another admitted ex-Communist, first took the stand, defense attorney Richard Gladstein asked the witness to remove whatever he had in his mouth.

The witness took out a large wad of snuff to the amusement of the courtroom and plopped it into a wastebasket near Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman.

Under cross-examination, Asst. U.S. Atty. Robert Schnacke asked Jones if he was still a member of the Communist Party.

"That's a very difficult question, your honor," the longshoreman replied. "Because if I say I am a member, he can bring in a half dozen Matusows, Paul Crouches and others to say I am not a member."

"If I say I am not, he can bring in those same mental prostitutes to say I am."

New Type Fighter Bomber Delivered

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The Tactical Air command has received delivery of a new long range super Sabre fighter-bomber that can carry and drop the atomic bomb at speeds faster than sound.

North American Aviation Co. delivered six F100C super Sabres here yesterday to a group of pilots of the 322nd Fighter Day group. The pilots flew the new aircraft to Foster Air Force base, Tex.

Major changes from the F100A are the addition of an in-flight refueling system, extra fuel drop tanks and bombs under the wings of the plane. The super Sabre holds the world speed record of 75 miles an hour.
