Portland—(U.P.)—J. Scott Milne, 57, president of the AFL International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, died of a heart attack today at his farm home at Corbett near here.

Milne, whose office is in Washington, D.C., had been vacationing.

He became president of the 625,000 member union in March of 1954, succeeding Dan W. Traay.

Milne had been secretary-treasurer of the international union since 1947.

Survivors include his wife, Doris, and two sons, Scott Jr., and Robert.

Funeral services will be held early next week in Washington, D.C.
