Chicago—(U.P.)—The American Medical association says that—advertising to the contrary—there still is some caffeine in decaffeinated coffee.

According to a report in the American Medical Association Journal, it has not yet been possible "to extract all the caffeine in commercially prepared coffee."

A cup of regular decaffeinated coffee has about one-third the amount of caffeine as is found in regular ground coffee, the AMA said. Regular instant coffee has about half as much caffeine as a cup of regular ground.
