The bulls bought Standard Oil of New Jersey on anticipation of a stock split. The issue rose 5 points and then gave up part of the rise. Bears covered some of their commitments in this issue which is a "hot" one to be short of. Texas Co. also was given a whirl up of more than 2 points.
