Woman Develops Colored Tires For Automobiles

Detroit — (U.P.) — Marcia Gottschall, believed to be the only woman tire development engineer in the country sees a bright future for the gaily colored automobile tires she developed.

She based her optimistic outlook on the fact that women more and more are taking over family purchases formerly handled by the menfolk.

"It is probable that a woman eventually will walk into a tire dealer's store and say, 'I would like to see a set of 6.70x15 green tires which have a maximum skid resistance. I would like a reasonably long-wearing tire, but I am not particularly interested in a high speed tire,' she said.

Miss Gottschall, a former mathematics teacher, is responsible for the blue, green, brown and yellow sidewall tints now on the market.

She joined the firm (U. S. Rubber Company) shortly after World War II in keeping with a new company policy of "providing personnel which would approach design problems for a variety of standpoints."

"For this reason a woman was hired since it was reasonable to expect that she would consider a tire design in terms slightly different from those of a male designer," she said.

Miss Gottschall noted that other rubber products such as hot water bottles and drainboards pads were appearing in gay colors instead of the "mon-

A four cents per hour wage increase for culinary workers in the Medford and Grants Pass areas has been agreed upon, it was announced Saturday.

The increase is retroactive to July 19, and a second increase of one cent per hour will go into effect next March 1, the announcement said.

The contract was worked out and announced by William A. Hoxie, secretary of the Culinary Alliance, Local 329, and Fred Morlan, representing the Medford Hotel and Restaurant association, and Louie Ruhl, president of the Southern Oregon Restaurant association.

ICE CREAM SAUCE
